The death occurred in North Tryon on Friday last after a short illness of William Kehoe aged 72 years. He leaves to mourn three sons and two daughters. The funeral took place yesterday at Kinkora, Rev. J. A. McDonald, officiating.

The death occurred at DeSable on Dec. 28th, of Mary McNeill, widow of the late Neil Shaw. The deceased had reached an advanced age of seventy-nine years. MacLeod) will remember her bright cheery manner, but above all her consistent Christian life, which was a daily sermon to all who knew her. Those who knew her best loved her most. Much sympathy is felt for all the bereaved ones, but especially for her four little children who are too young to realize the great loss they have sustained.

Although the night was very dry and there was a large number of present, had the night been fine many would have been present. Mr. Taylor is glad to be home again and thinks that farmers in this Province who are comfortably off have a good thing when they emigrate westward.
