B., did they hear any complaints of the abundance of rain.—The fishermen from the eastern section who fished at the Magdalen Islands this summer, and arrived home recently report only one day's rain during the summer. The fishing at these Islands was so much better than here, and not such as to induce our fishermen to return there another season.—Daniel D. Stewart of West River, died on the evening of the 14th inst., on the farm where he was born some eighty-seven years ago. Dan Duncan, as he was popularly called, was among the first, if not the first birth in the West River, whence his parents emigrated from Perthshire, Scotland, the year before. He grew up with the country, and saw that fine settlement redeemed from the forest primeval. His sturdy form was a familiar figure to successful generations. Intelligent, social and good-natured, he was a general favorite with all, and will be much missed in the circles in which he used to move.
