Contract Bridge

BAD BID ON TWO COUNTS: West's bidding in today's hand was bad for two reasons: first, he could have been doubled and set severely; and second, his bid drove the opponents into a game which otherwise they would have avoided.

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable. The bidding: South West North East 1 ♣ Pass 2 NT Pass 3 ♣ Pass 5 ♣ Pass Pass Double Redouble Pass Pass Pass

West opened the king of clubs. East overtook with the ace and returned a heart, hoping to reduce dummy's ruffing power. South won with the heart king, cashed the top diamonds, and led a heart to dummy's ace in order to get discards on the queen and jack of diamonds. Declarer then led a spade from dummy. When East played low, South correctly assumed that West had the spade ace for his bids and that East's trump was based on the spade queen. Hence South "finessed" the jack of spades, forcing out West's ace.

Some current "best sellers" merited criticism, although it was conceded that moving pictures of the same stories were usually free of the more objectionable scenes. The school committee which was reappointed for another month, reported the School Lunch Project progressing favorably. 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How to Starch Men's Shirts: Men's shirts are starched perhaps more frequently than any other garment in the home laundry. Here is a simple way to handle them. For all-over starching, use the "starch rinse" described above, or dip in a light starching solution. Then starch the collars, cuffs, and buttonhole bands in a thicker, hot-starch solution—or in a cold-starch solution, if desired. The trick is to gather together the button-hole band, the collar, and the button band as if you were pleating them. Hold tightly and dip in the starch. Squeeze in the starch, squeeze out the excess, and dip again. Repeat the process several times before finally squeezing out the starch and slapping the material between your palms.—Selected.
