WASHINGTON, Sept. 17. (AP)—The Office of War Information said today that announced casualties of the United States armed forces since it entered the war to date total 103,263.
Based on war and navy department reports, the total includes 20,104 dead, 22,226 wounded, 32,995 missing and 23,937 prisoners of war.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17. (CP)—The organization of the National Liberal Federation is being launched by a program of reorganizing the party's chances of success in the Dominion election here will be subjects of discussion at meetings across this week and next.
On Friday Prime Minister Mackenzie King will preside at a caucus of his members in the Senate and the House of Commons, and on Monday, Sept. 27, the Federation will open its first meeting since the outbreak of war, with seven

noting delegates expected from each province. Caucus members are expected to remain in Ottawa to take part in the general discussions at the Federation meeting, and many others, to come to Ottawa for the reorganization talks.
Hon. Norman McLarty, Secretary of State, is acting president of the Federation and issued the call for the reorganization meeting. In his statement made public Sept. 3, he said this step was taken in the face of continued organization work being carried on by the Progressive Conservative and C. C. F. parties. The move would appear to mark the end of the so-called political truce which has been observed to a considerable extent since the beginning of the war.

Election Rumors
In some quarters it is taken as an indication that a general election will be held shortly but the information available from sources close to the government is that there is little likelihood of an election this year.

But this is one of the issues that will be discussed and possibly settled at the caucus on Friday, or at the Federation meeting the following week.
Nearly 200 senators and members are expected here for the caucus
