Knox says some Sailors writing Fairy tales

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Navy Secretary Frank Knox intimated today that he thought some American sailors were reporting fictitious sea engagements in their letters home to impress their relatives.

Knox deplored the writing and publication of such letters because any sailor who writes one is telling a falsehood which may get him into trouble and which certainly deludes the people at home. Such letters are against his orders.

Knox recalled that when he commanded a battalion of the American expeditionary force on its way to the front for the first time in 1918 men who had never been closer than 20 miles to the front line wrote home "vivid letters of fighting" in which they claimed to have participated.
