Report of S'side Ways, Means Rink Committee

Following is the report of Ways and Means Committee re new Memorial Centre and Artificial Ice Rink for Summerside, submitted by Mr. H. E. Clark, convener: On the 4th day of November last the citizens' meeting called by His Worship the Mayor was held in the Town Hall, and at that meeting a Ways and Means Committee of eleven citizens was appointed to explore the above matter.

Dr. Hillard Clark was named convener and the other members of the committee were as follows: D. O. Stewart, T.D. Morrison, Dr. J.C. Simpson and one representative each from the Town Council, the Canadian Legion, Rotary Club, R.C. A.F., Y's Men's Club, Kinsmen Club and Summerside Board of Trade. The convener called a meeting of the committee which was fully attended. The following members of the committee were present: Dr.

instructions as the citizens' meeting might be inclined to give it or to be relieved of its duties at such meeting. Your committee feels that it has gone as far as it was authorized to go at the last citizens' meeting and believes that the matter should now be brought to a head and it should be ascertained if the Town Council is willing to explore the idea of making the necessary amendments to its act of incorporation which would give them power to embark on such an undertaking. May we report that we fully explored the idea of trying to raise funds by private subscriptions. No doubt some money could be obtained in this manner, but we believe it would be a very small percentage of the amount required for a community centre and rink. In closing this report, we do not feel it unreasonable that the Town should give consideration to the setting up of the necessary machinery to provide for the issuing of twenty year debentures at a low rate of interest which could be retired through the sinking fund set up for the debentures over a twenty year period. We believe that the revenue from such a community centre would be sufficient or almost sufficient to provide for the annual interest and sinking fund payments. However, this is only the committee's recommendation and if the Town Council is unable to comply, then we would again suggest that, though we are ready and willing to assist in any way in the project, that the committee be discharged even if a new one is named to continue work in the matter.

Name Newcombe And Sievers Top Rookies of 1949

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 — (AP) — Pitcher Don Newcombe of Brooklyn Dodgers and outfielder Roy Sievers of St. Louis Browns today were named the outstanding rookies of the 1949 baseball season by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Two 24-man committees took part in the voting. Each committee member was allowed to name only one man. The National League writers picked Newcombe almost unanimously, giving him 21 of the 24 votes. Del Crandall, 18-year-old catcher for Boston Braves, drew

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the other three votes. Sievers received the support of 10 of the American League writers to double the total of Philadelphia Athletics' Alex Kellner, his nearest pursuer. Naming the No. 1 rookies of each league represented a change in the annual balloting. Previously only one rookie was chosen for both circuits. Alvin Dark, Boston Braves' shortstop, won it last year, and Jackie Robinson, Brooklyn's second-base star, was chosen in 1947. In contrast to the National League, where only two players were named, the American had six nominations. The also-rans included Gerry Coleman, New York Yankees, four votes; and Mike Garcia, Cleveland, Johnny Groh, Detroit and Bob Kuzava, Chicago White Sox, one vote each. Two members failed to vote. Although he wasn't brought up from their Montreal Royals farm club until May 25, the 23-year-old Newcombe won 17 and lost eight for the Dodgers to rank as their best pitcher. The heavy-hitting Sievers earned the award by clubbing out a batting average of .306 in 149 games.
