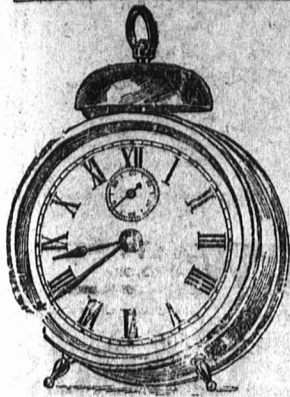

## QUEEN'S COUNTY GUARDIAN

Head Offices in New Prowse Block—Charlottetown

One of the smaller towers on the front of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, that to the southern side of the central cross, and between the cross and the large tower on the southern front corner, was broken by the gale yesterday.

A SITTING of the County Court of Queen's County was held at Clifton, New London, on Tuesday, before Judge Macdonald. One case was tried, that of Captain Sutherland, of Stanley Bridge v. John Canning, of Emerald. Judgment was given for the defendant, Sutherland.

At midnight last night the electric lights were shut off in the City in order to avoid any possibility of a cut-off through the effect of the storm on the wires. That, the system was in good working order until this precaution was taken speaks well for the Company, for the violence of the wind gusts was a almost unprecedented.

The Diocesan Church Society's annual convention is now being held in Charlottetown. Among delegates present are Rev. A. W. Nicholls, New London; Rev. R. M. Fenton, Alberton; Rev. The election of a mayor for Bridgetown, N. S., took place on the 9th inst. The two candidates were W. J. Hoyt and W. D. Leckett. One hundred and forty-eight votes were cast, one hundred and seven being in favor of Mr. Leckett, giving him a majority of sixty-six votes. Mayor Leckett has already served several times on the council board, and has proved himself a energetic and capable member. It was under his supervision that the sewer construction was put through last year. He will therefore bring to bear upon the present situation the tuition of experience as well as native tact and judgment. The new Mayor of Bridgetown is a son-in-law of James A. Lawson of the Post Office Department of this City.

The annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society of Prince Edward Island was held last evening in St. Paul's School, and there was a good attendance, taking into consideration the storm which was raging without. A number of topics came up for consideration but the chief matter was the proposal that Prince Edward Island should come under some system of affiliation with the Central Mission Board, which proposes to take control of the various mission funds of the diocese. A resolution was passed to the effect that at the next meeting of the Synod the clerical and lay delegates to the Synod should confer with the committee of the Mission Board with a view of finding out what terms of affiliation can be arranged.

The beginning of the Spring season, the vernal equinox, which begins today, has been marked with the proverbial equinoctial storm. Never have the vagaries of March weather been so violently exemplified than by the gale and snowstorm which began in the earliest hours of yesterday morning. The wind blew from the east and south east with a fury which has been unequalled all winter and snow fell and drifted till in places the banks were from two to four feet deep. At noon yesterday the snow ceased, the wind subsided, and a period of calm succeeded when the sun looked out from the clouds and shined warmly upon the snow-covered "lap of the afternoon Spring." At about 4 o'clock in the afternoon about 8 o'clock last night another gale from the north came to succeed the first one. Snow also fell and the tempestuous weather kept many people from going out last night. In fact the storm was a repetition of the morning's fury when the stress of the weather caused people to postpone their business engagements. Fortunately the weather was not cold, otherwise there would have been some unpleasant incidents to chronicle. Many of the streets yesterday morning were blocked, and the snowshovel brigade in the afternoon had plenty to do. Their work as a result of last night's auxiliary storm, will probably have to be repeated to-day. The country roads were drifted in many places, and the railway cuttings filled up. The only train that moved out in the morning was the train from Tignish to Summerside, which made the trip in safety. In the afternoon the 2:30 train from Charlottetown to Summerside got through all right; and the train came in from Georgetown to this City and left again at 8 o'clock with passengers for Georgetown to connect with the S. S. Minto which had remained at that port all day. The S. S. Stanley also remained in Pictou, and it was consoling to know that both the winter steamers, which have had such an adventurous winter, were not exposed to the severity of the weather. There was no crossing at the Capes, and the mail train did not leave the City for Cape Traverse last night. In fact there was practically a tie-up all round, which was not much to be wondered at.

The special general meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade has been postponed until to-morrow night at 8 o'clock.

Of the happiest little speeches of the Session was spoken the other day by D. P. Irving, M. L. A., in the Legislature, when the discussion regarding the proposed sale of the Stock Farm was going on. Mr. Irving, as a practical farmer expressed his sincere belief that the Stock Farm was of no benefit, and said that the proposal to provide an experimental farm in its stead was one for which the Government deserved the gratitude of the whole Province. We have here, said Mr. Irving, one of the most beautiful little spots in the whole world where all men should be happy, and the experimental farm will be of untold benefit to the farmers of the Island, for it will illustrate and make plain to them lessons which otherwise they might never learn. It will be a grand thing; and if the Premier and his co-delegates had done nothing more when they went to the Ottawa Conference to arrange about the subsidy for the Province, in getting the Experimental Farm alone they would have done enough to earn the thanks of the people of Prince Edward Island.

The following is the amendment to the Prohibition Act moved in the Legislature yesterday by Murdoch Kennedy, M. L. A. seconded by A. P. Prowse, M. L. A. - Any society, association or club, which has been or shall be formed or incorporated under any Act of Assembly, and any unincorporated society, association or club and any member, officer or servant thereof or person resorting thereto who shall sell or barter or give or dispose of to any member thereof or to any other person, any intoxicating liquor shall be deemed to have made an unlawful sale of intoxicating liquor contrary to this Act, and may be dealt with in the same manner as offenders under section twelve of this Act, and it shall be no justification or excuse for any person prosecuted or proceeded against for any offence under this section that such sale, barter, disposal or giving of said intoxicating liquor was done as the clerk, servant or agent of said society, association or club, or as a member thereof or that such sale, barter disposal or giving of said liquor was made to any member of said society, association or club, or to any person resorting thereto and further it shall be no justification or excuse for any person prosecuted or proceeded against under this section that the person or persons so selling, bartering, disposing or giving the said intoxicating liquor as aforesaid or the person to whom the same is sold, bartered, disposed of or given as aforesaid, is or was part owner of the said intoxicating liquor so sold, bartered, given or disposed of as aforesaid. The provisions of this Act relating to the granting of search warrants and procedure thereon shall apply to any such society, association or club, building, or in any room, cellar or place occupied or controlled by such club association or society, or any member or members thereof or by any person residing thereto, or any liquor, shall be deemed a sale within section twelve of this Act upon each day upon which such liquor is so kept. Proof of consumption or intended consumption of liquor in such premises by any member of such club, association or society, or any person who resorts thereto shall be conclusive evidence of the sale of such liquor and the occupants of the premises or any member of the club, association or society or person who resorts thereto shall be taken conclusively to be the person who has or keeps therein such liquor for sale, barter or disposal, and any liquor found upon such premises shall be liable to seizure in the manner provided by this Act.

The storm was not able to leave while the storm lasted but it is not likely that she will experience much difficulty in crossing after the gale subsides.

The present session of the Local Legislature has now lasted four weeks. There has not been a great lot of work despatched in the House—but it is ascertained that the Government and members have had much to do in caucus, and there is no doubt this is the case. This week, however, there has been a disposition to expedite business and a number of bills have been considered. Heretofore the discussions in the Chamber have been rather colorless, the chief debate having centered about the Subsidy arrangement announced by the Government at the opening of the Session. Had it not been for the enlightening interpositions of Captain Read on one or two occasions the proceedings in the House, from the point of view of the spectators, might have been classed as dull, stale, and unprofitable. The other day Captain Read speaking regarding the proposed experimental farm touched incidentally upon potatoes and population, the alternative glory of his title being ably sustained and amplified by the Captain's profound and entertaining treatment of the subject. Added interest and importance will doubtless attach to the debates from this time forth, owing to the introduction of the amendment to the prohibition law as to clubs, which is published elsewhere and to the fact that other matters of moment will come up for discussion.

At the Opera House last night's fair sized audience, which had the weather seen more propitious would have been a much larger, assembled to see played a charming little drama, A Daughter of Erin. The play in one that is to be commended, for it told a nice little love story in a quiet artistic way, and the amateurs who took the various parts interpreted the roles in a manner pleasingly free from the rudeness and exaggerations which often mar unprofessional work. Britannia" Bill Miss Doyle and Miss Callahan were notably good in their parts and their excellent work was suitably supported by Miss Robins and Miss Mullin who portrayed their characters with grace and fidelity. H. E. Cantwell afforded pleasure and satisfaction by his personation of the hero and a notably good member of the cast was J. Vincent Power, who acted well the old favorite, sustained the comic part which fell to his lot with his customary effectiveness and the other characters were well staged and afforded another evidence of the fact that the Charlottetown Dramatic Club may be counted upon to please and edify their audience when they appear upon the theatrical stage. There was a general feeling that last night's performance was deserving of high praise and there was widely expressed regret that the storm prevailing kept many from enjoying it. Specially deserving of notice was the music by Vincent's orchestra, which was altogether enjoyable, while the specialties were exceptionally good. These consisted of songs by such favorites as Mrs. James Byrne, Miss Lucy Blanchard, and Austin Trainor, all of whom were encored. Last night's performance left a distinctly pleasurable impression with the audience.
