THE OPENING OF THE EXHIBITION

The Exhibition building was attractively decorated, rather more than usual, and although the space was not yet full of the people, it will be today. There was a splendid showing of agricultural products in nearly every line, and the past good growing season is not without its bountiful returns.

In fruit the showing is superb. Apples, plums, pears, and fruit of all kinds were in abundance and some of them of the largest size and best quality. They are shown to the best advantage possible and are raised off to prevent handling.

Cheese is fairly well exhibited as in former years. Prince Edward Island cheese cannot be excelled. Butter is not as plentiful as in former years out what there is, is of a fine looking quality.

As usual two of the most interesting sections of the building are those in which are displayed the fancy work by the ladies and the art work. In the former there are some of the most delicately prepared fabrics exhibiting taste and refinement as well as capacity for doing intricate needlework and doing it well which makes the exhibit one of the finest ever shown here.

In the art work, great advantage has been made. Many beautiful life like sketches are represented. Many ladies are taking up this beautiful art and the number of exhibits testify to the fine work done.

In the exhibit of the household class there is a strong competition which shows that the ladies of the Province are not to be daunted in their housekeeping abilities. They know how to bake, make preserves, etc., which prove them to be good housewives.

Everything shown is first class and proves that in the line of manufacture or native products this Province cannot be surpassed.

The exhibits of stock, machinery, etc., are more than ordinary. The horses are a big class and many new horses and fillies show the interest taken in procuring only the best. Progressive man of this province have imported some of the very best high bred horses and as a consequence the stock is being raised to a higher level. Draft horses and carriage horses of all sizes, bulds and descriptions testify to this.

Cattle are also well represented. Many farmers are now exhibiting whole herds instead of one or two particularly good specimens of their herd. This shows that the farmer is not satisfied with one or two animals but must have the whole herd as high grade as is possible.

Sheep and swine are also of a high class order. In fact all the exhibits show a tendency of the exhibitors to raise their stock to the best possible grade.

The poultry show is well filled and many fine specimens of geese, turkeys, ducks, etc., are shown. The specialties of a high class quality and the very best ever shown at an Exhibition here.

On entering the main door of the exhibition building the visitor is at once struck by the lavish and tasteful displays made by local merchants in their attractive booths.

The display of furs by Frowse Bros Ltd., takes the eye at once. They exhibit a wide range of the richest and the very finest goods' comprising stoles and scarves of no. one Labrador mink, gray squirrel and Alaska sable. A real ermine set, scarf and pillow muff, and South Island seal 36 inch coat are articles that many women will pause to admire. Russian poncy jackets—the very latest and swellest thing out in New York—are also shown as well as many other luxurious coats. This firm also makes an elaborate showing of ready-made clothing, suits and overcoats for men and boys.

Next in the line of march to the right of the entrance is the Mark Wright Furnishing Co's very attractive and comfortable looking exhibit of beds, (brass and enamel), bedding, mattresses, comforts and curtains, and other house furnishings. This firm, which deals exclusively in house furnishings show by the samples here displayed that it is possible to get the highest quality of goods here—in fact they claim that they give the same prices as any mail order house.

Frowse Bros. show some handsome pianos and organs of such fine appearance and such exquisite quality of tone that lovers of music will find it difficult to decide on a favorite. But there are instruments to suit all tastes. In pianos they show the New Scale Williams, Heintzman, Dominick and Mendelsohn; and in organs

the Thomas, the Sherlock Manning, and the Dominion. Fine specimens of the New Home and Raymond sewing machines attest the superiority of this well-known firm in this branch of their extensive business.

There is a general, reassuring look about the Rogers Hardware Co's booth, the display in which is confined to only one line of this firm's wide-spread business. They show some of the finest kitchen ranges ever displayed here—comprising handsome and thoroughly efficient specimens of the Landora, Kootnay, Saskata, Oxford, O. K., and kitchen ranges. Many other photographs show that Mr. Bayer is most successful in portraiture. His pictures are one of the features of upstairs.

The Hillsborough Consolidated school make an exhibit that will be specially interesting to visitors. Some fine specimens of pupils' work in map drawing show superior skill and the samples of work performed in other lines of school work are certainly eloquent testimonials of the high quality of the school and its teaching staff. The exhibit of vegetables etc., grown by the pupils in the school gardens affords an uncontradictable evidence of the fact that the practical things which will confront many of the pupils in after life are not lost sight of in the school.

A kindred exhibit is that of the Manual Training classes of the schools in this City. Here is shown an array of articles made by the pupils in manual training that is fairly surprising in its general excellence. A close examination of many of the specimens on the benches is enough to convince any observer that the boy who has accomplished the making of these specimens has undergone a training that will be valuable to him. To teachers and pupils the exhibit is most creditable.
