SPANISH ANTIQUITY

PARIS, July 24.—The French Academy of Inscriptions and Belles-Lettres has been informed that M. Jean Gallotti, Inspector of Historical Monuments in Morocco, has discovered a large basin in sculptured marble in the Beni Youssef educational establishment at Marrakesh.

It was embedded in a wall, from which it had to be removed intact. It is a sort of marble bath, the sides of which are sculptured in arabesques and animals. An inscription shows that it was made for a minister of a Caliph of Cordova, Fishman II. It was carried at a later date across the mountains from Andalusia to Marrakesh, which was not found till the eleventh century. The only other basin of this character contemporary with this epoch is preserved in the Museum at Madrid. It is, however, smaller, and has been broken and partially repaired.

BROADWAY STARTLED

The Terror of The Skies

(By Dominion News Service)
LONDON, July 24.—An aerial battering-ram, than will sweep down like a hawk from the skies to prey upon slow-moving "troop planes" and transports, is being constructed secretly in England, according to newspaper reports. Described as the most fearful air weapon conceived, the new plane is to be a heavily armored, steel-nosed air-ram, a combination of airplane and javelin, which at the direction of its pilot would rush down to destroy larger, slower aircraft transporting soldiers or munitions. The new machine is designed for use with the air Leviathans that will act as mother planes to small battle flyers. Its only weapon is to be a knife-like prow to disable its adversaries. It is a one-man affair. The pilot will watch for enemy planes, and when one has been sighted detach himself from the mother ship and drop at tremendous
