The Society's method of dealing with the immigrant question was described. Agents of the Society seek to find the immigrant before he leaves his home and supply him with a copy of the word of God. Again at the port of debarkation he is met, also on arrival at any of the great parts of St. John, Halifax, Quebec or Montreal agents of the Society will welcome him and see that he is supplied with Scriptures. This work is of immense importance to Canada from a national standpoint as the Bible for the settler is a better citizen than the original vicious one. As a result of the Society's work many an immigrant has been saved to good citizenship. The great need of the work is one of British Columbia with its mines, lumbering, construction camps etc., today there is but one interpreter in British Columbia, there should be at least a dozen to enable the society to meet these demands more support must be given by the Christian people of the older settled parts of the Dominion. 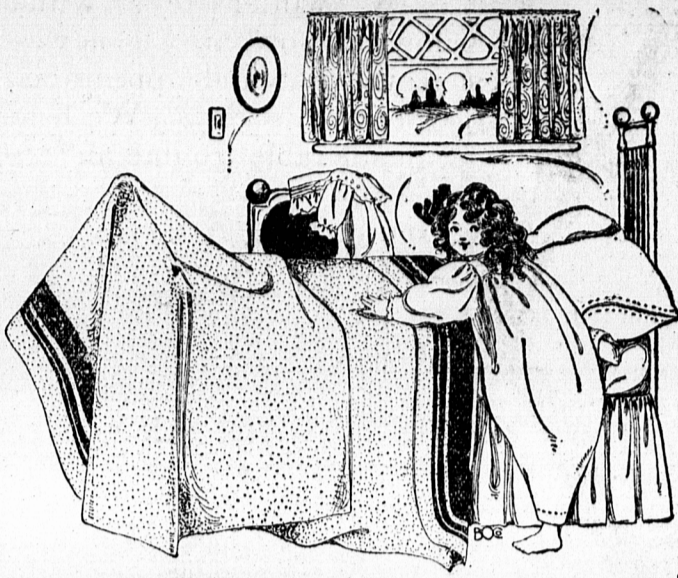
