Quantity of cheese manufactured was 151,612 lbs. and the average price realized 9.95 cts. per lb. The value of butter fat was 21 cts per lb, the average quantity of butter fat for a hundred lbs. of milk and the average price paid for milk 75.6 per 100 lbs. Sociable, charitable, religious, eminently solicitous for the welfare of her family, she left a place vacant in the community, and the home which time can never fill. (On Thursday morning her funeral took place to St. Teresa's Church; and despite the storm was very largely attended. A Requiem High Mass, Coram Episcopo was celebrated by the Rev. R. J. Gillis assisted by the Revs. D. M. McDonald, Tignish, as Deacon and I. R. A. McDonald as sub-Deacon. After the services at the grave, performed by his Lordship Bishop McDonald assisted by the above named clergymen the mortal remains were lowered to their last resting place, there to await a glorious immortality. The pall bearers were Messrs. H. R. Mooney, Hugh Currie, John McDonald, P. Mahar, E. Donnelly, and James Kelly. She leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband one daughter Teresa, three sons Peter and Dugald at home, and Ronald at St. Dunstan's College. Her surviving brothers are the Rev. E. J. Gillis, St. Peter's, Joseph, Boston, James Tignish, Alen and William Piquet P. P., and Conductor Gillis of Charlottetown, also two sisters Mrs. J. C. McDonald, Boston, Mrs. A. McInnis, St. Andrew's. ## JOHN NEWSON.

The Executive Committee of the Women's Council held a short session in the parlor of the Queen Hotel yesterday afternoon. A considerable correspondence was read from the National Council dealing with work being done by the standing committees and their request to have local sub-committees to assist. Their work includes domestic science, vacation play-grounds for children, pernicious literature, &c. Several resolutions were adopted by the Executive to be submitted to the annual meeting which will be held on the 14th of February in the Y. M. C. A. Parlor, commencing at three o'clock p. m. The very satisfactory report from the committee on sick ward for the Pot House was read and approved. The President reported the number of nomination papers filed in and received from the affiliated societies and noted several to be yet heard from. It is also expected that each society will have ready a brief report of their work to be submitted at the annual meeting, at which a full attendance is looked for.

The second of the series of the regular meetings of the Farmers Institute of Lots 27 and 28, was held on Wednesday afternoon at Cape Traverse. Despite the storm there was a good representation of leading farmers and an active and intelligent interest in agricultural matters was in evidence. A paper on institute work, read by W. C. Lea, at the last regular meeting was well discussed by Major Clark, Charles B. H. Benjamin Webster, Harry Webster, James E. Howatt, Bradford Clark, and the Secretary, Dr. Dougherty. Among the subjects dealt with, was the importation of seeds, and after considerable discussion on this point, a committee, consisting of Major Clark, Charles Bell and Dr. Dougherty, were appointed to draft a resolution urging co-operation with other institutes, with a view of bringing the question effectually to the notice of the legislature, so that the adulteration of seeds could be prevented. The meeting also considered the advisability of engaging, at the expense of the district, a capable man to spend a week or more in the district, and give instruction in pruning, spraying, and various branches of horticulture. This instructor would be expected to give practical demonstration throughout the day and a talk in the evening.
