EASTERN NOTES.—The annual meeting of the East Point Dairying Association was held at the factory on the evening of the 21st inst. The result of the year's work was satisfactory to both stockholders and patrons, and the old directors were nearly all re-appointed. The directors were empowered to provide a butter plant in time for operating the coming autumn.—Owing to the wet season last year, and almost total failure of crops, seeds of all kinds are scarce in this section of country, some of our best farmers being compelled to buy, and it is hard to buy at any price.—The cold and chilly air of the last few days has given place to a warmer and softer atmosphere, and the ice of a few days ago is rapidly melting under its powerful influence. Many fields covered with this ice the last few days probably means a poor hay crop the coming season.—Much heavy ice is still floating round the coast here, and its presence or absence seriously affects the climate, the health of the people, and the lateness or earliness of the season.—We learn that Edward La Pierre of Basin Head has purchased the farm at Black Pond, formerly occupied by the late John McIn's.

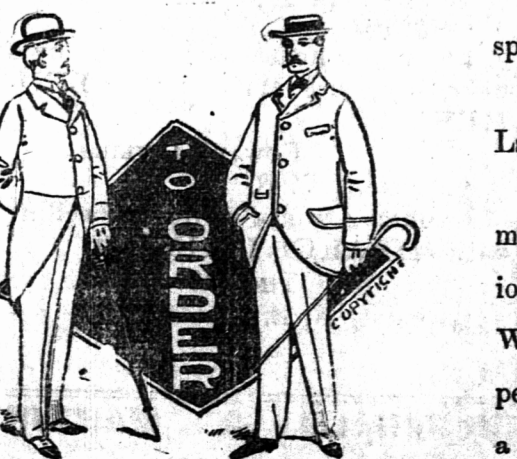

THE Halifax Chronicle says that the Black Diamond liner Coban, Capt. Running into heavy ice, several plates in her bow were smashed in and her rudder so disabled that she was forced to make Halifax at three o'clock this morning for repairs.

A LARGE apartment house, in two sections, is to be erected on Mount Pleasant avenue, Roxbury. It will be constructed of brick, three stories high, with a flat roof. Section A will have a frontage on Mt. Pleasant avenue of 180 feet, and section B one of 136 feet. The former will have a depth of 48 1/2 feet, and the latter a depth of 56 feet. Between the blocks there will be a park. The building will be divided in 27 departments of three to seven rooms each, with modern improvements. The front of the building and the sides facing the park will be of red face brick, trimmed with limestone and gray terra cotta and moulded brick, with sidelights and transoms of ornamental leaded glass. This will be one of the largest apartment houses in Roxbury. W. C. Collett is the architect. [Mr. Collett is a native of Crapaud, P. E. I.]

THE scheme to consolidate the bicycle manufacturing companies of Canada, is about completed, and it is stated that application will be made at once to the Dominion government for incorporation, under the name of the Canadian Bicycle company, with a capital stock of three millions, in hundred dollar shares, half preferred and half common. The object of the combination is to manufacture a cheap line of wheels for the purpose of competing with American wheels. The Canadian manufacturers with a small output can't do so. It is said all the larger Canadian companies will go into the scheme.

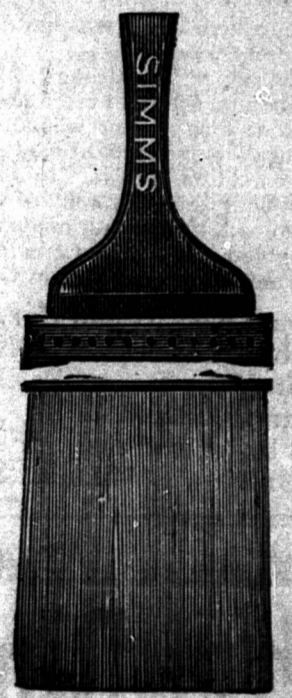
