Ontario Officer Listed Dead Is Only Wounded

OTTAWA, Nov. 10 — (CP) — Defence Headquarters announced tonight that Lieut. Bruce Clark Steele of Toronto, officially listed as having been killed in action, was only wounded in action.

In the 6th active army casualty list, released today, several officers killed in action. Several hours after publication of the list, headquarters reported that Lieut. Steele had been placed in the wrong category and should have been listed among the officers wounded.

Lieut. Steele's next of kin is his mother, Mrs. Alice Helena Steele of 312 Lansdale Rd., Apt. 6, Toronto 12.

Suspension Lifted On Mauriello

NEW YORK, Nov. 10 — (AP) — The New York State Athletic Commission today lifted its suspension of Frank Mauriello, Bronx heavyweight fighter, after he promised to go through with a bout against Leo Oms of Detroit.

Mauriello was suspended several weeks ago when he cancelled a bout with Oms, pleading illness and inability to get in shape. Three weeks earlier Mauriello had knocked out Oms in the eighth round of a scheduled 10-rounder which Oms went into on 48 hours' notice.

Promoter Mike Jacobs of the 20th Century Sporting Club immediately rematched Oms and Mauriello for a 10-round bout in Madison Square Garden Friday, Dec. 8.

Declares Coal Industry "Sick"

EDMONTON, Nov. 10 — (CP) — The coal industry "is pretty sick in Canada and throughout the world," L. A. E. Cameron, deputy minister of mines for Nova Scotia, said at a meeting of the northern Alberta branch of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy here last night.

Lack of co-ordination in the industry is serious, he said. "There must be co-operation between the mine owners, engineers and labor or it will remain ill."

As a step in solution of the problem it is planned to set up a coal division of the Canadian institute. This proposal would follow the example of the American Institute, which already has a coal division.

IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM HENRY JENKINS

There passed away at Boston, Mass., on the 30th of September, William Henry Jenkins, formerly of Birch Hill, Prince Edward Island. Mr. Jenkins was born on the 10th of August in the year of our Lord 1890 and came to Boston at the age of 17 years and lived in the city of Cambridge, Mass., for many years. At the time of his death he was in Allison, Mass. He was married to Jessie MacLennan of Cambridge, Mass., in the year of our Lord, on July 20th, 1910.

He was the father of six children, three of which are living, Walter Russell, married and living in Cambridge, Mass.; William David, married and living in Somerville, Mass.; Gladys who is living at home with her mother and is a nurse and a daughter of the late Ernest Jenkins of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Jenkins was a devoted and esteemed member of the Church of Scotland, at Cambridge, Mass., for the past thirty-five years and was a faithful servant of the Master whom he loved. He passed to his eternal rest with the praises of his Redeemer on his lips, and was not allowed to own his Lord. He is greatly missed from his place in the church and by all who knew him both in Boston, Mass., and in the Island Province.

The Rev. John Huffman officiated at the church, where the late William was sung. A prayer by Elder Philip Bishop, also a prayer by Rev. Huffman, 4 verses of the 96th Psalm was sung. Exhortation by the Minister who visited him while in the hospital, closing with the 66th Psalm. Interment was at the Cambridge Cemetery. 11-13-11.
