Dear Friend: On this the eve of your departure from amongst us, your friends here assembled, wish to express to you in some way, the esteem in which you are held by your neighbors and friends.

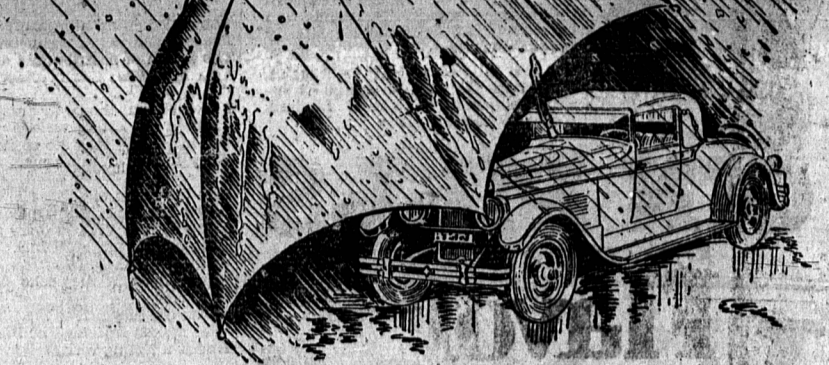
You kind and cheerful disposition has endeared you to young and old alike. You have at all times been ready to take your part in the social activities of the community.
