After their visit to the mine the party was entertained at supper at the Grand Hotel, Boat Harbour and point where they could look across the water made a pretty scene, one which will not be soon forgotten.

After New Glasgow the party went to Pictou where the entertainment was very lavish. At Pictou the party visited some of the largest canneries and also viewed some very beautiful things. Mr. Forke stated that the visit was filled with enjoyable moments and for those who come from the Provinces to see the beautiful hills and running rivers and scenic grandeur was alone a great treat. Added to this was the generous and kindheartedness of the people which went even further to make the trip a memorable one.

From Pictou the party took the steamer "Hochelaga" to Prince Edward Island. The sea trip was one of the beauties of the visit and could only be described as pleasant. The party is now on Prince Edward Island, "the beautiful Island of which we have heard so much" said Mr. Forke. He has been over 40 years in Canada and his ambition was to visit Prince Edward Island. He had never been able to realize this ambition until now and he felt glad indeed to be here. The party, said Mr. Forke, is looking forward with eager anticipation to seeing some of the beauties of the island. He hoped that they would visit some of the fox ranches and the dairies and he felt that the far Western members the visit would be most enjoyable.

There is nothing better in this world than the people the party met with on their trip and the pleasure they have derived from their trip. The people of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were marvellous and he felt they were just as good as Prince Edward Island. In bidding farewell to the Maritimes Mr. Forke thanked the people for all they had done for the party and the party on their return will have very pleasant recollections. In conclusion he said that anything that his party could do to promote greater Maritime prosperity would be gladly undertaken.

Mr. Keith Rogers announced the programme and the speaker. In conversation with a Guardian representative after the dinner Mr. Forke stated that the trip was organized by Mr. Gordon, one of the party. Last year a party visited Halifax and when this opportunity was afforded for a visit to the Province he was pleased to avail himself of it. Mr. Forke has never been in the Maritimes before although he has lived in Canada for 40 years. He is a native of Scotland having been born in Berwick. He is a member of Parliament and gives many privileges in meeting people but the best way of coming in direct contact with them, the Western members are specially glad to meet the Eastern people. At all the places visited Mr. Forke said the entertainment was wonderful and the party enjoyed the visits to the beauty spots and other places of interest. At the dinners and other functions he was given a great opportunity of discussing the great problems and problems of the country. He has sympathy for their troubles and with one desire for prosperous times in the Provinces. If he can help in any way he is willing to do so.

Mr. Forke said there is great similarity between the troubles of the Maritimes and those of the Western Provinces. He finds that the difficulties are much the same. In the West there are no large industrial plants so that they are in almost exactly the same position. The West has the advantage of lots of room for expansion but the Maritimes are different and he would like to see the Maritimes get their full share of the new settlers coming to the Dominion.

On the question of "Maritime Rights" Mr. Forke said it should be better called "Maritime Justice." The demands of the Maritimes for proper recognition were only just and if he could do anything to further the cause he was willing to do it. Mr. Forke hoped to have the pleasure of visiting the Maritime Provinces again and he felt sure that their tour of Prince Edward Island (Monday) would be fruitful of much that was good.

At nine o'clock this morning the party will be taken by motor to various points around the city and suburbs and at noon will attend a luncheon at the Experimental Farm which has been arranged by Hon. John E. Sinclair, M. P. After the luncheon the party will visit other places of interest and will attend a reception given in their honor at "Edgewater" by Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Heartz. The balance of the day will be spent in sight-seeing and visits to ranches etc. and in the evening there will be a dinner at Shaw's Hotel, Brackley Beach.

That their visit will be of exceptional interest and enjoyment to the Westerners is the sincere wish of all the people of Prince Edward Island, and it is hoped that a more friendly and harmonious feeling between the people of the East and West of this great Dominion will be the outcome.

After supper last evening the visitors gathered in the Dining Room of the Victoria Hotel around the piano and regaled themselves with sacred songs and hymns. Their voices were tunelessly blended in harmony and they sang all the old favorite hymns. A number of the other guests of the Hotel joined with them and a very pleasant and enjoyable evening was spent.

Says Canal Will Benefit 43,000,000
MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., May 24.—An outlet to the sea by canalization of the St. Lawrence River would benefit 43,000,000 people without taking a single acre of land from New York harbor, Henry J. Allen, Wichita, Kansas, former governor of his state, declared last night before the council of states of the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Tidewater Association.

New York does not want to handle according to Mr. Allen the bulk of the surplus tonnage of the Middle West, which seeks the foreign markets.

"The most effective opposition to the St. Lawrence project," said the former governor, "continues to emanate from New York."

Priest Dies In Pilgrimage To Rome
GRAND FALLS, N. B., May 24.—Rev. Elor Martin, parish priest of St. Andre, Madawaska county, for about 20 years, has died in Rome where he was on pilgrimage accompanying His Lordship Bishop Chasson, of Chatham, as secretary. The news of his death was received by Rev. Monsignor Dugal, of St. Paul, today in a cablegram, which was the first word that had been received concerning Father Martin since he sailed from Boston on April 23 for Rome.

His relatives in the county had been somewhat worried by the fact that they had received no communication from him but the news of his death was utterly unexpected and a great shock to the whole county.

Father Martin was born in St. Basil 54 years ago and ordained to the priesthood about 20 years ago. Practically all of his 20 years in the priesthood have been spent in St. Andre and he is dearly beloved by all his people.

In the cablegram instructions regarding the care of the body were asked for and a wish of his relatives a cable was sent to Rome asking that the body be brought to Canada for burial.

After Martin left St. Andre on April 23 and accompanied Bishop Chasson to Boston, whence they sailed with the pilgrimage to Rome.

O.K.'s \$477,690
OTTAWA, May 24.—The House of Commons in committee of supply yesterday evening took up estimates for the public works expenditures in Nova Scotia by way of breakwater extensions, rebuilding of wharves and other improvements of harbors and rivers in that province.

Items passed swiftly with little discussion. Shortly after 11 o'clock the committee rose, having passed 21 votes for the province totalling \$477,690.

The principal items were: For dredging at Lunenburg, \$60,000; Malagash dredging, \$25,000; North Ingouish breakwater reconstruction and dredging, \$28,000; Parrsboro harbor improvements, \$39,000; Sheet Harbor breakwater, \$20,000; St. Mary's River dredging, \$25,000; Windsor wharf extension, \$24,000.
