like children. What was the matter? Hell is the place where men remember and suffer. One day Mr. Moody asked me to go out riding; and after we had ridden a little way he drove into a

cornfield, went out to the middle of the lot, and then he said, "This is where it happened." I said, "This is where what happened?" He said, "Don't you remember the last time I was in Chicago that I told you a certain story, and you said the next time you came to Northfield you wanted me to show you just where it happened?"
