

GERMANS AGAIN FLY INTO FRANCE PERMITTED TO LEAVE

Aeroplane With Two Officers Aboard Crosses Frontier and Lands--Aviators Explain Gasoline Became Exhausted.

NANCY, April 25 (Special)—Another international military aviation incident occurred on the Franco-German frontier when a German army aeroplane alighted on French territory at Nord Arracourt. Two German officers in uniform, Captain Devall, chief inspector of aviation, and Lieutenant von Mirbach, were aboard. The local military police and French customs officers hastened to the spot, and Captain Devall explained to them that his gasoline had become exhausted and he was compelled to descend, but he had thought at the time of landing that he was on the German side of the frontier. The Deputy Prefect Luneville and other French administrative officials made an investigation into the affair. The Minister of War and the Minister of the Interior were communicated with. They decided that the landing of the Germans was unavoidable. The aeroplane was then released, and left here for Metz. The German officers thanked the Sub-prefect for the care he had exercised to protect the aeroplane, and asked him also to convey their thanks to the French government. A telegram from the French Foreign Office was sent to Mr. Jules Cambon, the French Ambassador at Berlin, telling him to call the attention of the German government to the repeated landings of German military aircraft in France and to the serious inconvenience brought about by such occurrences. Mr. Cambon was directed to ask Germany to take measures to avoid the recurrence of such incidents, and to discuss with France the drafting of rules for settling future landings of this kind.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

APRIL 27. JOSEPH SOLD INTO EGYPT. Gen. 37. GOLDEN TEXT. "Love envieth not."—1 Cor. 13: 4. POINTED SUGGESTIONS. By Rev. D. W. Snider.

Important and very practical lessons are to be learned from the life of Joseph, concerning the fond follies of parents, the cruel envyings and fratricidal treatment among brothers, the exasperating talk of ambitious dreamers, etc. Jacob blundered as father, the brothers of Joseph acted the part of despicable bullies, while, only relieved by his youth, Joseph's talk about his future greatness was vaporing and vanity. Better had he kept such dreams to himself and pondered them in his heart. Behind the action of the bully, there is usually to be found the anxious heart. Why honourable brothers, whose time is filled with honest toil, should give themselves to the "yellow eyes" of envy because a younger brother had glowing dreams to tell is strange, indeed. But a too dotting father can add fuel to unwanted flame and the superior character of the dreamer will thrust the conscience with vexations and condemnation. Joseph's brothers, thus affected, became here-in-wait for opportunity. All things come, Alas! that so many envious creatures are in hiding around the corners of malice, "abiding their time." That is the chuckle of revenge. "Just wait! I'll fix him! I'm abiding my time." Such people forget that they are in the clutch of the devil all the time. The opportunity came to Joseph's brothers. It came, bringing them provisions—well laden with good things in their behalf. But envy must plan before it can eat. The awful thing about it is that it can eat when it thinks its hell-born plans are working. That is the heartlessness of it: "they took him, and cast him into a pit...." And they sat down to eat bread." And while they were eating bread they were satisfied to know that the object of their jealous dislike, thirsty from his journey, could not have a drop of water. The pit was empty; there was no water in it.

SEES GREECE AND BULGARIA AT WAR

Dispute Over Possession of Salonica Rapidly Becoming Acute.

LONDON, April 25 (Special)—Bulgaria and Greece are rapidly drifting toward war over the possession of Salonica, according to the Chronicle's correspondent at that town. The Greeks have mobilized every available soldier and concentrated one army in the neighborhood of Salonica, while another is being landed at Orfani, in the Gulf of Orfani, in order to watch the movements of the Bulgarians at Drama and Orfani. The victorious Epirus army from Janina is being distributed along the new strategic front from Salonica to Orfani. In the meantime, adds the correspondent, the Bulgarians have suspended passenger traffic between Dedegatch and Salonica and are utilizing the railway for the concentration of troops in the neighborhood of Drama close to the Greek position. They have already brought one division each from Adrianople, Tchataldja and Bulair, and it is estimated that the Bulgars now have 90,000 soldiers facing the Greeks and a Servian force supporting the Greeks, which is assembling along the railway north of Salonica and on the right bank of the Vardar River.

Government Accepts Advice of King and Liberal Compromise Cabinet Decides On a Surrender.

BRUSSELS, April 25 (Special)—The King, the government and the liberal leader, Mr. F. Masson, and the great strike for manhood suffrage, which, on account of the remarkable discipline maintained, the solidarity of those who joined in the movement and skilful organization, is unique in history, will be called off on Thursday. Only a week ago the Belgian Premier, Mr. Charles de Broqueville, declared:—"No government could yield to a strike of this nature. To yield would be to abdicate." Nevertheless, the strike seems to have made sufficient impression on the government to induce it to unbind from its uncompromising attitude far enough to insure the termination of a situation which already has cost the country many millions, and is daily driving away from the manufacturers customers which never may win back. The decision to accept the compromise was reached yesterday by the Cabinet, and the Premier announced in the Chamber of Deputies today that the government had made Mr. Masson's motion its own. When the Chamber of Deputies met this afternoon there was a tense feeling of expectancy. The conciliatory motion of Mr. Masson, the Liberal leader, was taken up immediately. Mr. Lobaert, a Clerical Deputy, proposed an additional reading:—"The Chamber disapproves and condemns the general strike."

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON.

May 4. JOSEPH INTERPRETS DREAMS. Gen. 40. GOLDEN TEXT.

"The breath of the Almighty giveth them understanding."—Job. 32: 8. POINTED SUGGESTIONS.

This much is most certainly in evidence from what is told of the life of Joseph: namely, that it is possible to live through evil as well as through good report, through circumstances painfully adverse and in places of plenteous prosperity, with a clean conscience. Joseph maintained the serenity which a good conscience gives. Long before Paul's day he learned how to be abased and how to abound. Take close thought of the conduct of Joseph in the house of Potiphar. It is not his character which suffers under the searchlight. He fell into the suffering and impoverishment of the dungeon not because of what was bad in him, but because of what was commendable. It was not his fault that a lust-driven woman, resourceful with her audacious deceptions, brought shame and suffering. Many are the innocent who suffer. But "vengeance is mine, saith the Lord."

Under what circumstances do men not seek comradeship? The companionship of prisoners is not common. Good things have come out of it and, doubtless, much of evil. Social science teaches the dread of what the youthful prisoner may learn from the veteran in vice. This must be reckoned upon, however, that where men are met together, there will they tell their stories and reveal their dreams. It is not wise to scout the place which is given to dreams in the Bible. There is no doubt that God has used them as a means of revealing His guidance to man. It is not for the overfed and gluttonous to

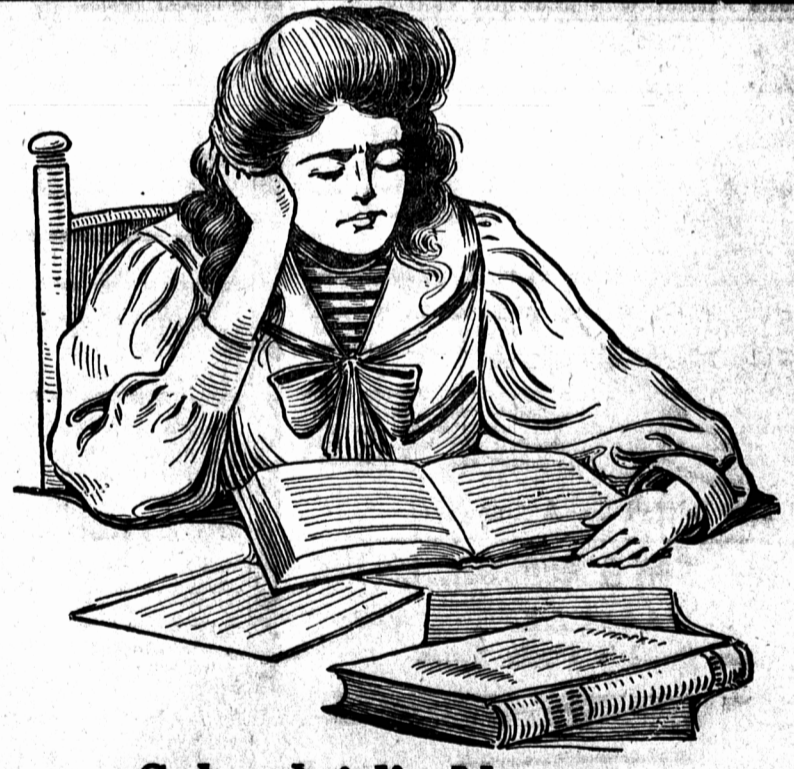
MT. ROCHEFORT'S CREST TOPPLES OVER

NEW YORK, April 25 (Special)—It was announced at the New York

offices of the Hamburg-American line that cable messages received from the company's office in Hamburg denied the report that the company's new steamship, the Imperator, had run aground while on her way to Hamburg to start on her trial trip. The representatives of the steamship company in this city stated that the cable message received by them declared that owing to strong east winds and very low tides it was deemed advisable to anchor the big steamship in the lower Elbe for several hours and that this gave rise to the report that she was aground. It was said that as the winds went down the Imperator proceeded on her way and will start on her trial run at once.

FLORAC, April 25 (Special)—The crest of Mount Rochefort, dominating this town, fell off today. An enormous mass of rock estimated to measure 30,000 cubic yards rolled for a mile and a half into the valley, destroying fields, gardens and orchards. Its passage was marked by a frightful grinding noise. It stopped at the outskirts of a village. No one was killed.
