MRS. IDA M. CAMPBELL.

The village of Pownal has recently lost one of its best known and most highly respected citizens in the death after a long and painful illness of Mrs. Ida M. Campbell.

Mrs. Campbell was the daughter of William Wood of Alexandria, where she was born 66 years ago. After her marriage to Mr. Francis H. Campbell she went to reside in Pownal and lived there right up to the time of her death. Her position as post-mistress brought her into intimate touch with everyone in the community, while her unflinching courtesy and efficiency won for her universal respect.

But, perhaps, it was her relationship to and interest in the church, and her readiness to help in every benevolent enterprise, which secured for her such affection and respect from all sorts and conditions of the community. Yet her goodness was not ostentatious. Her left hand often did not know what her right hand did. Only those who knew her intimately had any adequate conception of what she did in the way of helping others. Her fireside always gave a warm welcome to the traveler and there was no need for any wanderer to lack food or shelter so long as they could reach her door. Her services to her church were of the same generous, unostentatious character. Before others were astir on Sabbath mornings the choicest plants and flowers would be taken from her house and placed in the pulpit or on the communion table. Even during her sickness she flowers sent to brighten her own room found their way into the church. She was intolerant of anything and everything which militated against the dignity of public worship, torn books being replaced, and disfigurements being removed or remedied by her own hands or through her generosity. Her minister more than anyone else, were sensible of her kindness, and none will miss her more than they. Mrs. Campbell was not perfect, who is? She never claimed to be. But no more truthful and fitting epitaph could be inscribed over her grave than this: "She hath done what she could." (Written by a beloved pastor.)

POCKET PHONE.

The Berlin police have a new device that promises a revolution in telephone arrangements, when it shall come into general use. The pocket phone as now used enables messages of the force to communicate with headquarters at any time and from almost any point in the streets of the city, with a readiness impossible to the older forms of police telephones. Each officer—including the woman detectives—carries a tiny instrument, practically a microphone, which he can take from his pocket and hang upon any one of the weather-tight and fool-proof terminals, which are placed in convenient localities, and communicate readily with headquarters. The instrument is practical and works efficiently, and there is no reason why it should not be adapted to many uses. Its exceeding simplicity commends it, certainly, for it is vastly different from the huge, unsightly boxes, containing costly telephones with which our American cities are decorated. The pocket instrument takes up little more space than an ordinary watch would occupy and weighs next to nothing.
