BRIDGE REPAIRED - Darnley bridge which was almost completely destroyed by the storm and high tide the latter part of September is now almost completed. Six hundred feet of approach on the East side of the bridge and all the spans were washed out and carried away. The rebuilding is under the able management of Mr. Gilbert Perry with Mr. Donald Mahar as business manager. There were upwards of one thousand feet to be rebuilt, three hundred feet of which is creosoted pile work with hard caps and steel rails. The bridge is also being fitted with wire guard rails. Work was commenced on the 6th of October with about thirty men employed and within five weeks teams were passing over the new structure. Much credit is due Messrs Perry and Mahar for the expeditious manner in which they have carried on the work as well as for the substantial manner in which it has been rebuilt. -X.
