Gen. Hamilton has advanced views on the necessity of military training and advocates a compulsory cadet corps for all boys, maintaining that the majority of voters want it.

BALKAN CRISIS IS VERY NEAR

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Sept. 25.—The crisis in the Balkans is causing great disquiet among the diplomatic here. Incidents of the crisis were in the arrest today of Austrian soldiers on the Serbian frontier and the firing by Turks at the Greek steamer at Sames, embittering the people of the state directly interested and it will, it is thought, take all the ingenuity of the foreign offices and representatives in Turkey to avert the Balkan outbreak so often predicted.
