EXPERTS TESTIFY

AN AUSTRIAN ATTACHE

DR. ROSE IS IN TROUBLE BOUNTIFUL HARVEST

Has Resigned His Position in The Kootenay Lake General Hospital.

NATIVE OF LAKEVILLE, P. E. I.

A Petition to Be Forwarded to College Praying That Dr. Rose Be Allowed to Continue.

"The College of Physicians and Surgeons have instructed Messrs. Elliott & Leinie to institute proceedings against Dr. Rose, the newly appointed surgeon of the Kootenay Lake General Hospital. Dr. Rose has resigned his position as house surgeon but will remain at the hospital until he has qualified under the provincial statutes." The above notice was sent to the Miner by the officers of the Kootenay Lake General Hospital. Doctors, when coming to British Columbia from other provinces or countries must pass an examination before the College of Physicians and Surgeons before practicing. However, it is customary when the new arrival is a reputable practitioner and comes well introduced to allow him a little leeway and not to stick to the very letter of the law. The examination of course must be passed, but no undue haste is exercised in bringing it on. Before Dr. Rose left Montreal for here Dr. Koddick, M. P., probably the most prominent doctor in Canada, wrote the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Victoria, stating

that Dr. Rose was coming to take his position in the hospital, that he was a very capable man, and that he hoped nothing would be done to hinder him from starting on his duties at once. Since arriving at Nelson Dr. Rose has been communicating with the college and expected to hear from them concerning his examination any day. Word reached him through a channel that was not expected to be heard from. There is a nigger in the fence-somewhere.

The hospital directors meet to-day to decide what is to be done. Dr. Rose has meanwhile resigned but he will practically continue his present duties as it will be an easy thing to appoint him head nurse, or even caretaker, and let him go ahead. It is likely that a petition signed by all the doctors in the city, will be forwarded to the college, praying that Dr. Rose be allowed to continue in his duties until he passes his examination. He is willing to take it as soon as called upon.—Victoria Colonist, Aug. 22.

The Flower Beds At The Experimental Farm

ARE A MASS OF BLOOM.

Prof F. T. Shutt in His New Laboratory—Dr. Sanders Movements.

OTTAWA Aug. 29.—At the Experimental Farm harvesting operations are now centered on the crop, which is bountiful. The corn will be the next crop harvested.

As yet no report can be made of the new varieties of grain sown, but all have yielded abundantly.

Now is the time for lovers of flowers to visit the farm, it is a mass of bright colored, fragrant blossoms. The beds and borders are the pride of the officials and the envy of visiting horticulturists.

In the orchard the crop is a magnificent one. Many of the trees are propped up owing to the immense weight of fruit.

The melons, tomatoes and tobacco plants are also coming up well.

Grapes have also turned out well, and are free from worms and bugs.

Prof. F. T. Shutt took possession of his new laboratory this week, and he and his assistants are busily removing the extensive apparatus from the old building to the new laboratory. The latter is a handsome brick structure, designed by Prof. Shutt and admirably adapted for its purpose. The ground floor contains the offices and laboratories. Upstairs are the drying rooms and the room for photography. The third storey and basement will be used for storage purposes. A large amount of new apparatus is at present on its way from Germany.

A great many of the officials are at present away from the farm engaged in their different work. Mr. Wm. T. Macoun, the horticulturist, is touring through the United States, visiting the Experimental Farms.

Prof. Saunders is in Columbus, O., where he is attending the annual convention of the Society for the Promotion of Agricultural Science. Prof. F. T. Shutt is still continuing the experiment with soft pork.
