Applications for such should be forwarded to the Provincial Electrical Inspector immediately so that arrangements may be made for examinations. Holders of Provincial Licenses for 1932 will not be required to pass an examination.

OTTAWA, Aug 10—The National Art-Collections Fund of the United Kingdom has recently purchased for \$2,000 from the collection of the late Lord Barrymore a picture and an important example of Dutch art of the period.

LIFE OF A MILK BOTTLE

(Canadian Press)
TORONTO, Aug. 10—Some one writes to the press about the life of a milk bottle. A milk driver whom he questioned said: "It lasted from three to four trips in the winter, and five to six trips in the summer. He also estimated that the consumer was responsible for two-thirds of the loss, plant and delivery men for the balance. I think he was wrong, but since I have heard and read of estimated losses between these figures and 25 trips I think it is a matter worth considering.
"Personally I think that there should be a charge made on the bottles. As the matter stands today, the consumer who uses reasonable care will probably not be responsible for the loss of one bottle out of 500 delivered to him, yet he has to contribute as much toward replacement as his neighbor does. And his neighbor uses milk bottles for home-made jam, preserves, pickles, flower vases, and so forth, while his children put the bottles on posts to throw stones at, and the head of the house will throw the bottles at cats. Surely it is unfair to the careful and decent householder.
"If there were a charge made for the bottles the parties responsible for the loss would have to bear the loss themselves. I believe, too, that if this were done there would be an appreciable decrease in the number of bottles broken by the delivery men, they would have to exercise care as they would be required to turn in somewhere near as many bottles as they took out, or the equivalent in cash."

450 POUND FISH

MONTREAL, Aug 10—The answer to every fisherman's prayer, a 450-pound tuna fish, was on exhibition at a wholesale fish dealer's in Montreal recently. Measuring eight-and-one-half feet from mouth to tail and about two feet through the thickest portion, it was caught after a two-hour fight off Lockport, N. S. Before giving up the fight it towed a boat containing a man, a small boy and a cargo of herring, through the water at an average speed of 11 miles per hour.
