GIANTS CLINCH NATIONAL LEAGUE PENNANT

Schumacher Hurls Mates To 2-1 Victory In Opening Game Against Boston Bees

NEW YORK, Sept. 24—(CP)—New York Giants climaxed their success today by clinching the National League pennant. Topping off an astonishing drive they nosed out Boston Bees 2-1 in a 10-inning pitching thriller in the first game of a Boston doubleheader to sew up the flag. They lost the second 4-0.

Their victory made the first New York series since 1928 a certainty with New York Yankees as the American League representatives.

"Prince Hal" Schumacher, question mark of the Giants' pitching staff, accomplished today's win almost single handed but a costly error by Bill Urbanski was a big help. Urbanski juggled Travis Jackson's grounder in the 10th and then threw wide past first, enabling the veteran third sacker to reach second. Schumacher brought him home with a single.

In the second game, Terry replaced most of his regulars with second string men and the Bees won behind Bill Weir's six-hit pitching.

The first game victory was the Giants' 51st against 18 losses in the spectacular drive that carried them from second division to the championship between July 15 and today.

The Brooklyn Dodgers closed out their home season by splitting a doubleheader with Philadelphia.

The Phils took the opener when Jose Gomez singled in the 13th inning with the bases filled, driving in two runs for a 4-2 decision. The second game had to be called because of darkness in the seventh with Brooklyn winning 4-2.

Pittsburgh shoved Chicago deep into the third place by beating

the Cubs 4-0 in the final game of the National League season at Wrigley field.

Cy Blanton held Chicago to three hits as the Cubs made nine off Larry French in eight innings and one off Tex Carleton, who worked the last frame.

Behind the pitching of Dizzy Dean at St. Louis the Cardinals won the second game of a double-header from Cincinnati Reds today when darkness ended the game in the 6th inning with the score 2-0. The Cards had won the opener 5-4 in 12 innings. It was Dean's 24th victory.

Mrs. Darling Again Reaches Golf Final

POINTE CLAIRE, QUE., Sept. 24—(CP)—All that was in the way tonight of Mrs. A. B. Darling sweeping the Canadian Open and Close golf championships—a feat done only twice before in the history of the golfing classic—was Mrs. F. J. Mulqueen, of Toronto, a golfing veteran who knows all the shots.

The Montreal matron, winner of the Open only last Saturday, and Mrs. Mulqueen fought against the elements over Beaconsfield club's 6,000-yard layout today to register 4 and 3 and 3 and 1 victories, respectively over Mrs. H. W. Soper of Montreal and Toronto's Ada Mackenzie.

The rain started down and the wind blew heavily as Mrs. Mulqueen teed off against the oft-time champion and it still was raining and blowing as the victors qualified for an 18-hole match-play final tomorrow.

Mrs. Mulqueen eliminated Miss Mackenzie—the woman who won both crowns in 1926 and 1933—with a steady, over-par display. She came through on the home nine, which she reached two up, after watching the lead disappear at the 12th.

It was not until after the turn that Mrs. Darling eliminated Mrs. Soper. Outplaying the Open Champion, Mrs. Soper hit the turn one up, taken with a par three on the troublesome fourth.

POINTE CLAIRE, QUE., Sept. 24—(CP)—A Maritimer qualified for one of the consolation finals of the Canadian women's close golf championship over Beaconsfield club's course today while another, Babs Creighton, of Yarmouth, N.S., met defeat in a semi-final.

Maisie Howard of Halifax scored a convincing 7 and 5 triumph over Eleanor Smith of Montreal in the semi-finals of the first flight, qualifying to meet in tomorrow's final Mrs. John A. Rogers of Winnipeg, who defeated Margaret Northwood, also of Winnipeg, 5 and 3.

Miss Creighton, the Maritime Champion, lost by 2 and 1 to Mollie Hankin of Montreal in the championship consolation. The match ended on the 17th hole after Miss Creighton just failed to even the match.

JOLIET, Ill., Sept. 23—Packey McFarland passed into the world beyond today, gamely fighting his last battle.

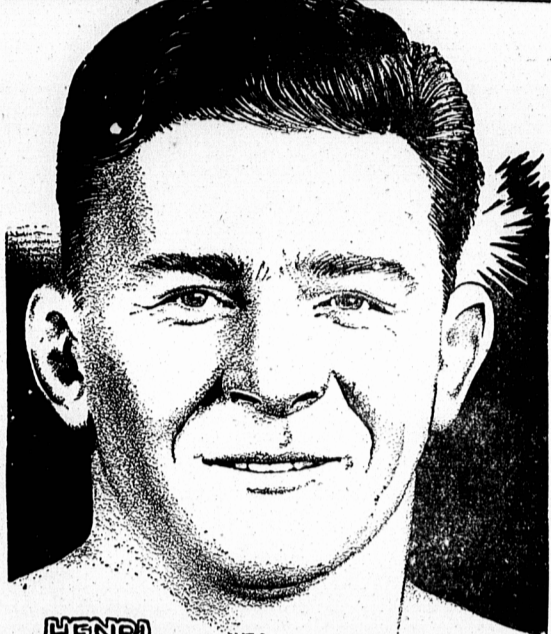

Yankees Predict World's Series Win In Five Games

NEW YORK, Sept. 24—(CP)—New York Yankees, American League pennant winners, closed out the season on the home lot today and left for Philadelphia predicting a world's series victory in five games.

The Yankees figure Carl Hubbell may beat them once, but not a man, from manager Joe McCarthy down to the rawest recruit, concedes even to a master craftsman as the Oklahoma pecan grower can take their measure twice in a seven game series.

Confident, the American leaguers see almost a clean sweep in the fall classic despite the fact Lou Gehrig and Signor Joe Dimaggio, two of the big berthas in the most powerful Yankee offensive in years, are wrestling with batting slumps.

Most of the Yanks pick big Charlie Ruffing, their ace right hander, to open the series, but McCarthy refuses to commit himself. With 19 triumphs to his credit, Ruffing gets his last dress rehearsal in Philadelphia tomorrow.

Lefty Gomez, experiencing at best an in-and-out season, goes against the Senators Saturday. If Gomez can flash anything like the form he displayed in firing a two hitter against the Griffins last week, some of the Yanks think McCarthy may shoot him against Hubbell in next Wednesday's opener.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24—(CP)—The championship New York Yankees were in a liberal mood today as they decided to cut their 1936 world series melon into 27 full shares with large slices for part time players, secretaries, assistants and attendants.

In addition to the regulars, outfielder Jake Powell, who came to the Yanks in June from Washington in the Ben Chapman deal; outfielder Myril Hoag, forced out for the season with illness and Don Heffner, an appendicitis victim, all were voted full shares.

Rangers Press Aberdeen For League Lead

GLASGOW, Sept. 24—(C. P. Cable)—The Scottish Football league rounds into its eighth week Saturday with a possibility Glasgow Rangers, runner-up to pace setting Aberdeen, will take over leadership. Rangers led the loop August 19 but since then the Dons have taken control and are one point up on last season's cupholders.

Both teams have home games tomorrow. Aberdeen will have to play hard to snatch both points from Motherwell while Rangers should defeat Dunfermline at Ibrox Park. Motherwell, always a hard-fighting outfit, cannot be underestimated and there is a chance the leader's record of no losses in nine games may be broken.

Although the Glasgow club is the only other team in the circuit without an entry in the loss column, the club's record in a large measure is due to exceptional goal-tending by J. Dawson. Dunfermline showed plenty of scoring power power last week, blanking the last-place Queen of South 5-0, against far superior opposition, however and playing away from home the squad can hardly hope for victory.

Perhaps the best game of the day will be staged at Tynecastle Park between Hearts and Celtic. Hearts are in a third place tie and the Celts in fourth position, one point less. So evenly matched are the clubs the result could go either way.

Dundee, tied in points with Celtic, has done remarkably well so far this season, having only one loss against them. Queen's park, Glasgow's famous amateur club, provides the opposition this week at Hampden Park.

The rest of the card presents no outstanding clashes. Falkirk and St. Mirren, the two clubs that practically romped to promotion last year, play on foreign soil. Falkirk goes to Perth to meet St. Johnstone and the Paisley representatives meet Queen of South at Dumfries.

Hamilton Academicals entertain Third Lanark, Hibernians tackle Clyde at Shawfield Park and Arbroath go to Kilmarnock to complete the card. Raith Rovers and Morton lead the parade in the Second Division. Both have "away" games, the Rovers at Cowdenbeath and Morton at Leith. Edinburgh City, with seven losses in as many starts, meets King's Park at Marine Gardens.

Will Attempt To Better Auto Speed Record

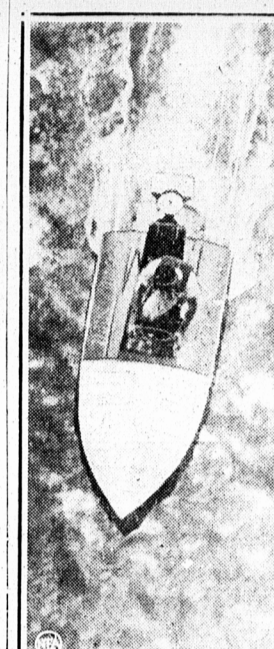
LONDON, Sept. 24—(CP)—Capt. George Eyston, British holder of numerous long distance auto speed records, announced today he is building a car to attack Sir Malcolm Campbell's record of 301.33 miles per hour in 1937.

"I am uncertain yet where I will make the attempt," Eyston said. "I would like to make it on the Salt Lake, Utah, flats but do not like to say so because I have not yet received an invitation from officials there."

The car, which is said to be of remarkable aerodynamic design capable of doing 330 miles per hour will be powered by a secret British airplane engine.

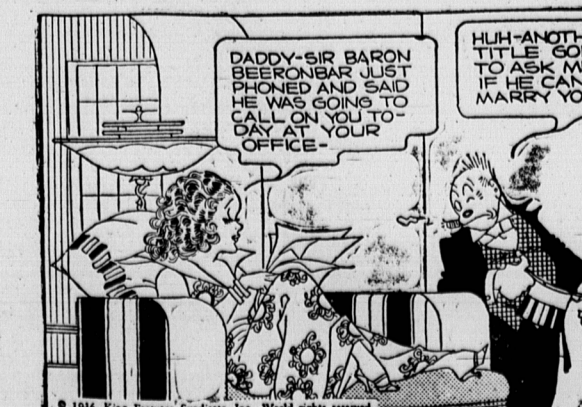
