DR. A. J. FRASER, Montague, has kindly donated a silver medal to be awarded to the pupils of the Eastern Inspectorate sending Inspector McCorne the best essay on "Hygiene" prior to June 15, 1905. The advanced classes in every school of the Inspectorate will no doubt make an effort to win this valuable prize.

TEACHERS of the Eastern Inspectorate should bear in mind that Inspector McCorne offers for competition among the school children fifteen dollars worth of books to be awarded to those pupils sending him the best specimens of map drawing prior to June 1st, 1905. The prizes will be distributed among Grades IV, V, and VI. Five dollars worth of books will be given to each grade. Two years ago Mr. McCorne had a similar competition and on that occasion over 500 specimens of map drawing were placed in competition. It is hoped that the teachers and pupils will take a like interest in the present contest.

Mr. Ramsay will be congratulated on his purchase which is a great addition to Island stock.

A MEETG of the P. E. I. Hockey League was held in the City Building yesterday afternoon. There were present Cecil McArthur, Harry M. Baker and Wm. McNeill, Crystal Pioneers; L. B. McMillan, Jas. McMillan and J. R. Darke, Abegweit; and W. B. Prowse, H. S. McLeod and Chas. McQuillan, Victorias. The matter for discussion was the two protests recently made to games. In the Victoria protest to the intermediate game in which Herrell, whom they claimed as one of their team played with the Abegweits the protest was thrown out 6 to 3. In the protest to the Victoria Crystal gain on the charge that an umpire had let on the result it stood 3 to 3, the Abegweits delegates not voting. The second protest was thus dropped.

IT is expected that in March next a large amount of trout fry will be transplanted to Kelly's Pond, Rosebank on the shores of which the New Dominion trout hatchery is erected. The hatchery and dwelling were erected by Parkman & Craib and the former is 10 ft. x 25 ft. thoroughly equipped. A little below Kelly's Pond is that of A. E. Morrison, the lay part of which has been damaged and is furnishing excellent ice to many buyers at present. Mr. Morrison expects to have, besides a charming spot for a summer residence, one of the finest trout reservations in the province within the next few years.
