CONAN DOYLE ON THE WAR Sir Arthur Conan Doyle writes to London Daily Chronicle as follows: "I have read with interest and admiration, Mr. Well's article dealing with the probable course of the war. I think however, that he dismisses much too easily the idea that the war may be ended by the absolute defeat of the Germans on the field. Bloch was a far-sighted thinker. He saw clearly the war of trenches. But he did not see the power of modern guns and of high explosive shells. Had he done so he might have hedged a little in his conclusions. Both the British and the French at the end of September were very nearly through. Their resources by the spring, both in men and in shells, will have greatly increased. They will also have the valuable experience of these partial victories to guide them. Above all, they may have evolved protective devices by which the assailants may get to close grips without undue loss. Our failure to do this has been one of our blots upon the management of the war. Almost from the beginning it has been under discussion. Yet, now in the 15th month a Canadian Colonel writes to me: "We have now at last got about fifty helmets to the regiment. How many lives would have been saved had we had those earlier!" If Bloch's trenches have proved themselves to be formidable they may on the other hand, be recognized later as being the most dangerous military formation ever adopted by an army. If by a sudden concentration they could be broken, and a mobile force got through the gap, it would not be a case of capturing cannon by the tons or of bag every heavy gun along the whole front. By a single movement you outflank everything and make every position untenable. Bloch holds the field for the moment, but it may be that his view will go down in military history as an exposed fallacy. I for one refuse to accept the dismal and enervating doctrine that this war can only come to an end through the inglorious methods of exhaustion.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE SHORT COURSE

The third short course in Household Science which has been in session at Prince of Wales College since Jan. 31, closed on Saturday 12th inst. There were 31 students enrolled in this course and the interest shown by them in their work has been most satisfactory. The fourth class will be enrolled at Prince of Wales College at 2 p.m. this afternoon.

The lectures in House Furnishings are dealt with under the following headings: Harmony of decorations and furnishings, principles of art and design applied to furniture, hangings and pictures. Planning of color schemes and the furnishings for various rooms.

In the classes in millinery all have the opportunity of doing the practice work, which includes the making and trimming of hats, and also the making of taff roses, violets and daisies from ribbons and silk.

The lectures in Home Management take up the arrangement of the kitchen, value of system in the daily routine of the home, also the keeping of household and personal accounts. Table setting and serving is also fully discussed and emphasis is laid on the importance of attractive service.

The lectures on Hygiene, the relation of bacteria to disease is dealt with the various ways they gain entrance to the body, and the conditions under which they flourish. The importance of sunshine and fresh air in our homes is brought out in these lectures.

Dr. Garrison in his lectures on the "Prevention and Treatment of Tuberculosis" explains fully how the disease is contracted and the care and treatment of the patient in the various stages of the disease. Emphasis is given to the importance of proper food, pure air, and sunshine, also to the importance of keeping up the resisting power of the body.

Prof. W. R. Reek in an interesting address on "Care of Milk and Cream on the Farm" urges upon the women the necessity of cleanliness in all operations in connection with dairy work. That the best utensils should be adapted in carrying on this very important part of farm work is clearly demonstrated to the class.

Prof. "Ross" in discussing "Farm House Conveniences" deals with the various labor saving devices which can in many cases be installed in any farm house with very little expenditure.

London Daily News had with Mr. Lloyd George. "It is," added the Minister "an effort such as Great Britain has never made—a truly prodigious effort, in the days before the war she had the greatest fleet in the world, but now she has one of the greatest armies, and in a very short time it will be about the best equipped army in the world."

Mr. Lloyd George spoke of this achievement with evident pride and continued: "But that is not all; a new Britain is now being developed—a new industrial Britain. Under the great pressure of war we are increasing and improving and quickening our industrial resources to an extent which would have been impossible but for the demands of this conflict."

"Let me give you just one example. In the first place we have introduced scores of millions worth of automatic machinery which will have an enormous effect upon our industries when the war is over. In addition to that we are adding to our already great industrial army of skilled workers, and we shall need them all in the future to repair the ravages of the war."

"This country, therefore, so far from being impoverished, will be richer in everything that constitutes real and true wealth. We shall be a better-organized, better-equipped, better-trained and, what is more important perhaps, a better-disciplined nation. In fact, we shall indeed be a nation and not a congeries of conflicting interests."

Mr. Lloyd George has not a shadow of a doubt that the Allies will win the war. He was confident a year ago. I asked him the question at the Treasury chequer, and he is confident now. It was with the same flash of the eye that he replied, "Yes, I am still that opinion."

"To my question about the strength and solidarity of the alliance, Mr. Lloyd George replied at once—"The Allies are as firmly united now as at the beginning of the war. When I hinted at the possibility of industrial trouble at home, Mr. Lloyd George retorted:— "I refuse to believe that such a thing will occur. I am convinced that those who will entertain for a moment the idea of this hampering our gallant troops at the front, are but a very small fraction of the workers."

I made an allusion to industrial competition, and Mr. Lloyd George remarked with a tinge of indignation, "It is merely a bogey employed by those who would create trouble in order to further their object."

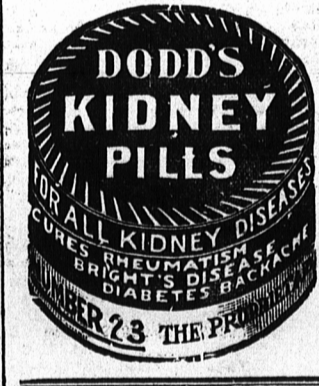
