### Belgian Middles Face Partyless Stay in Bermuda

ST. GEORGE, Bermuda, Apr. 1. —(CP)—The three-masted auxiliary Belgian training ship Mercator will arrive here about April 5 from Colon, but there will be no entertainment for her 10 officers and 30 midshipmen and few shore leaves for her 60 men.

For the ship, just completing a long cruise, will be carrying "the venerable ashes of the Belgian priest, the Rev. Father Damien, who is also known as the Apostle of Leprosy and who died on Mokol Island," according to a letter received by A. E. Nicholl, Belgian consul here, from Commandant R. Van de Sande of the Mercator.

The body of Father Damien who spent a life of sacrifice among the lepers of the Hawaiian Islands and died there in 1889 is being brought back at the request of King Leopold to Belgium where he was born for re-interment.

The Belgian missionary was born in 1840 and was admitted to Holy Orders at the age of 19. In 1874 he went to the Leprosy settlement in Hawaii and spent the remainder of his life there as a physician and helper. Attacked by leprosy himself in 1885, he continued his work until death. He is now the process of beatification at Rome.

Captain Van de Sande's letter written in Colon, said he had instructions from the government to proceed directly home "out of respect to the remains above mentioned. However, to complete our provision stock and take on fresh water I have decided to make a short stay at St. George's Harbor.

"This visit to the Bermuda Islands cannot be considered official, and consequently all receptions have to be excluded in accordance with the orders I have just received."

The 770-ton brigantine which has trained Belgian sailors for years left Antwerp on its cruise last October. Since then she has visited the South African coast, Mauretania, Rio de Oro, the French West Indies, Para and Manaoa in Brazil, Trinidad and Colon.

During the cruise she made several fishing expeditions to gather specimens for the Royal Museum of National History of Brussels and represented Belgium at the 300th anniversary of Martinique's affiliation to France.

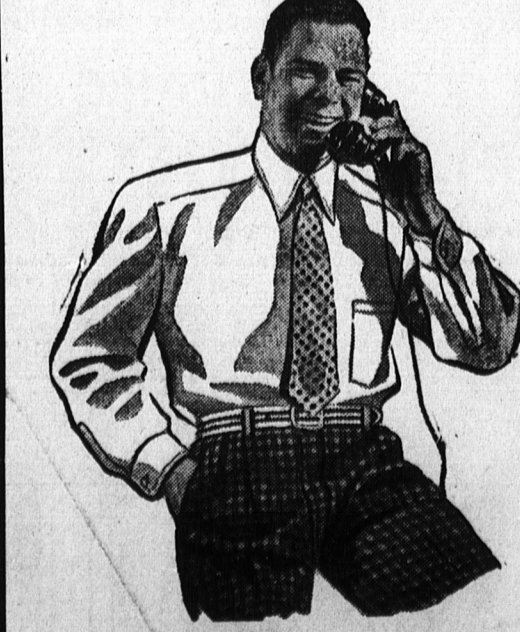
