### MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, the fourth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, and was constituted by the Moderator, Mr. A. S. Stewart, besides whom were present, Messrs T. F. Fullerton, A. J. W. Black, John Hawley, D. McLean, A. Craise, ministers, and John A. Lawson, elder.

Mr. T. F. Fullerton reported that acting for him, Mr. D. Fraser, moderated in a call at Georgetown, on Monday, the twentieth day of May last, that the call came out unanimously and heartily in favor of Mr. A. J. W. Back, Brookfield, that it was signed by fifty-one (51) communicants and forty (40) adherents, and that it was accompanied with a guarantee of eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$850) stipend in weekly payments, with use of manse, and a yearly vacation of one month. The conduct of Mr. Fraser was approved. The clerk stated that he had cited the session and congregation of Brookfield, Hunter River and Clyde River to appear for their interests at this meeting, and his action was sustained.

Messrs D. D. McDonald, John Dalziel and D. Montgomery, commissioners from Georgetown, testified to the unanimity and heartiness of the people in their efforts to secure the services of Mr. Back. Mr. Simon Brown, commissioner from the congregation of Brookfield, Hunter River and Clyde River, spoke of Mr. Back's good and faithful work there and the desire of the people that he continue his ministrations among them. The call was, on motion, sustained as a regular gospel call, placed in the hands of Mr. Back, and accepted by him. It was decided that the translation be granted and the pastoral tie dissolved, to take effect on and after the twenty-third day of June instant. Arrangements were made for the induction of Mr. Back at Georgetown on Thursday, the twenty-seventh day of June instant at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, as follows:—The Moderator of Presbytery, Mr. A. S. Stewart, to preside and induct, Mr. A. D. McIntosh to preach, Mr. D. Wright to address the minister and Mr. T. F. Fullerton the people. Mr. D. McLean was appointed to preach at Georgetown on the two Sabbaths preceding the induction and to read the edict. Presbytery expressed sympathy with Brookfield, etc., and the hope that they may soon have a settled pastor. Mr. T. F. Fullerton was appointed interim moderator of Brookfield, etc., and instructed to have the charge declared vacant as soon as possible after the 23rd instant.

A communication was read from Mr. R. Murray in regard to matters at Richmond Bay West and Inverness. Whereupon it was decided, on motion that Mr. Murray be instructed to meet with and inform the session of Richmond Bay West that Mr. Kyle will be required to take the whole field inclusive of Inverness, and Mr. Duncan transferred to another field, unless they agree to co-operation in the working and financing of these two catechists under present arrangements. Presbytery then adjourned to meet at Georgetown, and within the Pres-

### CHOICE CATTLE SCARCE WITH PRICES 25c HIGHER

MONTREAL, June 7.—Cattle prices are 25c higher owing to the small run at the West End market yesterday, to the continued scarcity of choice stock, and to the keen competition for supplies.

The daily receipts totalled 400 cattle, 125 sheep and lambs, 1,500 hogs, and 300 calves; for the week 900 cattle 600 sheep and lambs, 2,500 hogs, and 1,100 calves. Butchers' cattle, choice, \$8 to 8.25; butchers' cattle, good, \$7.75 to \$7.75; cattle, medium, \$5.75 to \$6, cattle, common, \$5, choice, \$6.75 to \$7, butchers' bulls, to \$5.50; butchers' choice cows, \$6.50 to \$6.50; bucks and culls, \$5.25 to \$7, medium cows, \$6.75 to \$6, bulls, to \$7; medium cows, \$5.75 to \$6; bulls, medium, \$6 to \$5.50; milkers, choice, \$80 to \$90, springers, \$50 to sheep, ewes \$5.50; lambs, \$7.25 to \$7.50; hogs, f.o. b., \$9.25 to \$9.40; calves, \$5 to \$10.

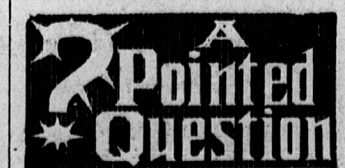
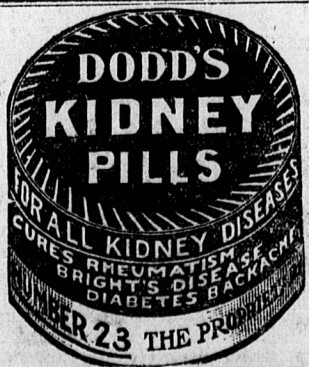
