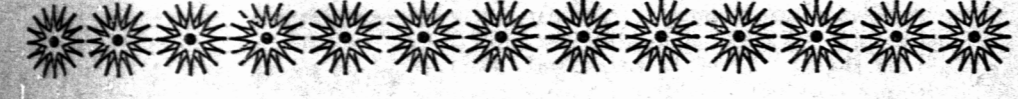

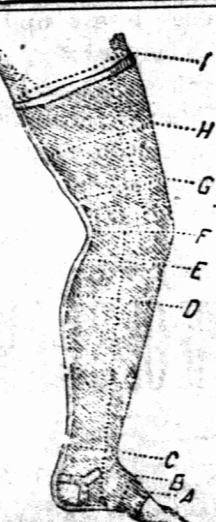

It is so dom London it is afflicted by two consecutive days of steady downpour; but consolation lies in the knowledge that the cry for "water, more water" is now no more. After all, London rain never seems so wetting, as that one gets elsewhere. Those of us who but rarely indulge in the still popular hansom, can always have recourse to the lumbering but congenial "bus; the general humidity pervading the interior of these unwieldy means of conveyance is more easily imagined than described. In endeavoring to efface the suicidal tendency engendered by this atmospheric depression, I tempted myself, last evening to a performance of "A Reonancy Girl" and certainly Harry Nicolls and Seymore Hick, the collaborators, have contrived an evenings amusement calculated to banish, pro tem, more serious troubles than the weather. 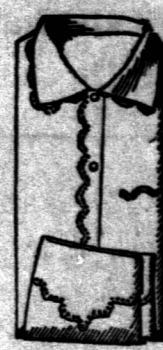
