THE HOSPICE OF THE GREAT ST. BERNARD.

Lord Guthrie has been visiting the Hospice of the Great St. Bernard, and sends to the "Scotman" an interesting account of his experiences. The hospice, Lord Guthrie reminds us, is in Switzerland, but the Italian frontier, within which stands a colossal statue of St. Bernard, is only 300 yards off. You can travel either from the Swiss, or the Italian side; in either case, if you want to see the place, the monks, and the dogs, properly you must stay overnight.

Coming from Italy, you go by rail from Turin to Aosta, three hours' journey, and then drive 20 miles in a public motor, to the hospice. If you start from the Swiss side, you leave the main line at Martigny, take the electric train twelve miles to Orsières, and diligence thence 16 miles to the hospice, through the very "Alpine village," celebrated by Longfellow in "Excelsior."

The return journey either way, or through journey, need not cost more than £1. Lord Guthrie, who had previously visited the place in 1869, notes many changes for the better. Instead of the chill bedrooms, the cold beds, the dim light, the tough beef, and the sour wine of that date, he found the reception-room containing a piano presented by our late King) and the bedrooms warmed by "central heating," electric light everywhere, and the food though plain, of excellent material, well cooked and expeditiously served.

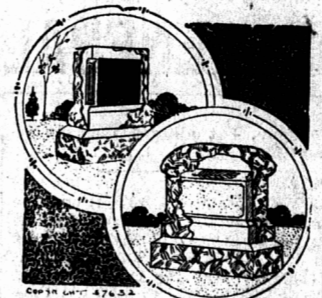
A BABY SILENCER.

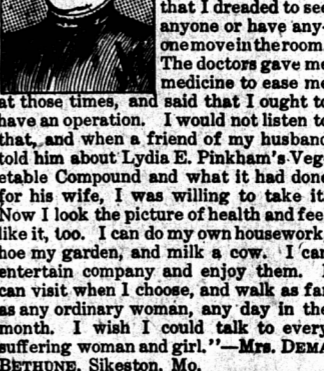
