THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., April 20.—A firm tone continues to prevail on Canadian egg markets. The recent cold snap in the west is serving to keep markets steady here.

TORONTO.—This market is very firm and unchanged, with dealers quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs, extras 30-31, firsts 28-29, seconds 25-26, delivered cases returned.

MONTREAL.—This market is firm with a good demand on all grades. A mixed car has been sold at extras 31, firsts 29, seconds 27. 1b. Manitoba shipping point.

MONTREAL, Que., April 20.—The only export business reported on the Montreal grain market today was the sale of a few loads of wheat to the continent. The trade in cash in the domestic market was also quiet, but prices were firm. The flour was dull and featureless, but prices for spring and winter wheat grades were unchanged. The undertone to the millfed market continued firm under a good demand for all lines. The price for standard grades of rolled oats was quiet but steady. The demand for butter showed some improvement and prices were marked up a fraction. Eastern townships No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 38c per pound. The receipts were 443 packages.

The cheese trade was without any new feature to note, the demand being quiet and prices ruled steady.

Western grades were quoted at 16-12c to 17c per pound. The receipts were 1574 boxes.

A moderate amount of business was worked in eggs and prices were well maintained. The receipts were 1,577 cases.
