Of course in the initiative it was a matter of guess work to determine at what price liquor could be sold to furnish a sufficient revenue for the purposes of the Act, and the prices fixed were slightly higher than was actually required for this purpose. But this was not known until four months after the Arsenal Government had retired, when the returns of the first six months trial disclosed a profit of over thirty thousand dollars. When this first report came in in December 31, 1919, showing this large profit, and following the intention of the late Government, was the proper time to reduce prices, so that "THE SICK AND NEDDY" would be enabled to get their medicines "AT ACTUAL COST" as promised by the Bell combination, or "AT A SMALL ADVANCE ON COST TO MEET EXPENSES OF ENFORCEMENT OF THE ACT" as intended by the Conservative Government when they originated the plan. Instead of this reduction the price was twice advanced, fifty cents per bottle each time, with the result of \$50,000.00 of these unholy profits turned into the treasury. And this plus the \$2,000 TAXATION-LICENSE fee from the two wholesale dealers provided for by their taxation act.

MONTREAL 13

There was no further change in the condition of the local market for live hogs yesterday, but the undertone continues easy at the recent decline noted in sympathy with the weaker advices from other Canadian centres, and the fact that packers were only bidding \$13.50 per 100 lbs. for selects in the Toronto market on Monday, and the range of prices was from that up to \$14 fed and watered. The offerings here yesterday were more than ample to meet the wants of the trade, and the market was quiet, with sales of selected lots at \$14.50 per 100 lbs., heavies at \$13 to \$14 and sows at \$10.50 weighed off cars. There was a slight improvement in the demand for dressed hogs to meet immediate requirements, and sales of city abattoir fresh-killed stock were made at \$22.50 per 100 lbs.

A good steady trade continues to be done in most lines of smoked meats for local and country account, and the market was fairly active, with no change in prices to note, but with the easier feeling in the market for live hogs, the prospects are that there will be a readjustment of prices in the near future. Sales of 8 to 10-lb. hams were made at 35c per lb., 10 to 15-lb. at 33c to 34c and 18 to 25-lb. at 32c to 33c. Windsor selected boneless bacon sold at 51c to 52c per lb., and

breakfast grades at 38c. The demand for trimmed hams of fresh pork was good, and the movement was large at 35c per lb. and trimmed shoulders at 22c to 23c per lb. The trade in lard continues slow, the demand being chiefly for small lots to meet actual wants and sales of American refined grades were made at 15c to 15 1/2c per lb. and Canadian grades at 16 1/2 to 17c per lb. in 20-lb. wood pallets. The receipts of provisions today were 175 packages lard, 11 boxes hams and bacon, and 1,073 packages tinned meats. Chicago, April 12.—No adequate support developed for provisions. At the close prices varied from decline 1.5c advance. Future quotations were:
