EXTERIOR COMPLETED - "At present the exterior of the building is practically completed. Money For Boat Pressing Need, Meeting Told

The immediate need in the establishment of a West Point ferry is sufficient funds to purchase a boat to let the Maritime Commission know the sponsors mean business. It was revealed last night at a public meeting at Verdun Theatre in O'Leary. With that in view stock up to \$100,000 in value will be offered for public subscription.

The meeting was sponsored by the West Point Board of Trade. The president Peter Pate presided. Speakers included several leading business men from the western sections of Prince County and from Summerside and Charlottetown.

The West Point ferry company has a suitable boat in sight, the meeting was informed. If the purchase price can be secured then it is considered possible that a federal subsidy will be forthcoming to assist in the operation. A terminal is available at Butouchou on the New Brunswick side and a suitable pier could be provided without great cost on the Prince Edward Island end.

The meeting adopted without a dissenting voice a resolution putting the West Point Board of Trade and the meeting on record as "unanimously endorsing the proposed West Point ferry service."

Speakers at the meeting included: Sanford Phillips and A. J. Mathieson, both of whom outlined the proposed service and the work done in promoting it to date. T. Earle Hickey, president of the Summerside Board of Trade, Forrest Phillips, M. L. A., 2nd. Prince, Walter Richard, M.L.A., 1st. Prince, Charlottetown Board of Trade, W. E. Agnew, P.E.I.-Nfld. trade agent, Capt. Basil Kelly, Summerside, Fred Ramsay, M.L.A., 1st. Prince, Walter Bernard, Tignish, Wilfred Tanton, Alberton, B. Graham Rogers, Charlottetown Capitan Ferry, O'Leary, Ray Tinney, Summerside, Lt.-Col. W. W. Reid, Travel Bureau supervisor, Charlottetown.

Building Fund

Roy Cudmore gave a resume of the financial position of the Y. M. C. A. Building Fund. Through the generous donations of the public, approximately \$150,000 have been raised in cash or pledged. Approximately \$10,000 of this amount cannot be collected due to various reasons. In addition, the old Y. M. C. A. building has been sold for approximately \$25,000. Due to the sharp increase in the cost of materials, labour, etc. the construction of the new "Y" has been considerably in excess of the amount originally estimated. Already \$150,000 has been spent. Mr. Cudmore urged the co-operation of all those who will be responsible for raising additional funds in the coming campaign. He expressed the opinion that the public would continue to support this worth-while project to bring to a successful conclusion the construction of the new "Y" to harbour the youth of our city and province.

Jim McConnell spoke on the organization of the new "Y" and outlined the manner in which it would be operated in the future. The program for boys and girls will operate for juniors who are will consist of groups, gymnasium classes, handicraft, table games, interest groups, photography, musical and dramatic events, etc. Occasional open house programs will be arranged for the parents and friends of junior members. The adult program will consist of gym classes, clubs, handicraft, photography, and other interest groups, social recreational activities, badminton, volleyball, bowling, basketball, etc.

In closing, Mr. McConnell said that Y's Men are indispensable to the life of the Young Men's Christian Association. Y's Men can be forward looking men who will recognize the Y.M.C.A. as a fellowship of both youth and adult people united by a common loyalty to Jesus Christ for the purpose of developing Christian persons and a Christian society.
