A despatch from Sydney says: In a dense fog on Wednesday night the Black Diamond liner Cacouna colli- ded with the French fishing schooner Union, off St. Pierre. Prompt work by the colliers saved the Union from going to the bottom and the Cacouna towed the disabled craft to St. Pierre where she is now repair- ing. The collision occurred in a heavy fog and the crew of the Cacouna never saw the schooner until they were right on top of her. The steamer was only running at half speed, and the engines were instantly sent astern. The schooner was not badly damag- ed.

The marriage took place last evening at the residence of her uncle A. J. McLaine, Prince Street, of Blanche daughter of Mrs. Georgie McKinnon, to David Cochran, of Kincairdine-on- Firth, Scotland. The ceremony, which took place in the presence of the im- mediate relatives and friends, was performed by Rev. T. F. Fullerton. On Thursday morning the newly wed- ded couple will leave for Montreal, where they will spend the honeymoon for Glasgow, Scotland, thence by train for Mr. Cochran's home in Kincairdine-on-Firth, to reside there in the future. Miss McKinnon was a valued employee of M. Trainor & Co's store and yesterday flags were flying over the store in honor of her mar- riage.

The physical department commit- tee of the Y. M. C. A. met yesterday afternoon and mapped out a full and interesting program of athletic sports including the following. On September 26th a relay race will be run from Summerside to Charlot- tetown between two teams of runners consisting of nine senior members who will run five miles each. The other team will be made up of forty-five junior members who will run one mile each.

There is already great interest shown in this race and guessing as to which team will win.

In order to provide funds for this race an athletic meet will be held on Aug. 28th from 6.30 to 8 o'clock, ad- mission ten cents. A number of the best athletes have already expressed their willingness to enter these sports to help make both events a success. The events for the athletic meet will be 100 yards dash, 1 mile 1 mile, and mile runs, Broad jump, high jump, pole vault and a relay race.

The membership committee are ar- ranging a membership contest to se- cure new members. Any one joining the Association before the Summer- side Race will be eligible for either of the teams. Any member under 18 years of age will be eligible for the junior team. A big banquet is another part of the plan laid out. This will be held on Sept. 29th. All new members and all who have suc- ceeded in securing a new member, to- gether with all the runners in the great relay race will be invited to this banquet where the gymnasium winter sports will be fully discussed. It is hoped that this will open up the most successful winter of sports yet held in the Y. M. C. A.
