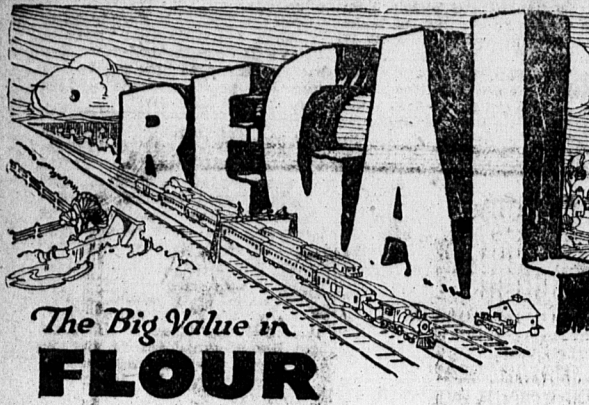

### The Great Question

Sir:—The question now occupying the attention of very many of the inhabitants of P. E. Island today is, how can we get enough competent school teachers to be obtained and retained, to assure the generations that are to come an education commensurate with the enlightenment and demands of the times?

The Manitoba Government, a year ago, appointed a Royal Commission to investigate the question as far as Manitoba is concerned. The report of this commission has recently been submitted to the Legislature. The commissioner gave the following suggestion as to salary:

"Pay enough to attract to the teaching profession and to keep in it men and women who are intelligent and competent; pay enough to keep up a steady flow of new blood into the profession to replace those who die, or who marry, or who drop out for any reason. The commission suggests that the minimum that should be paid for teachers holding second class certificate should be \$1050, and for those holding third class \$950.

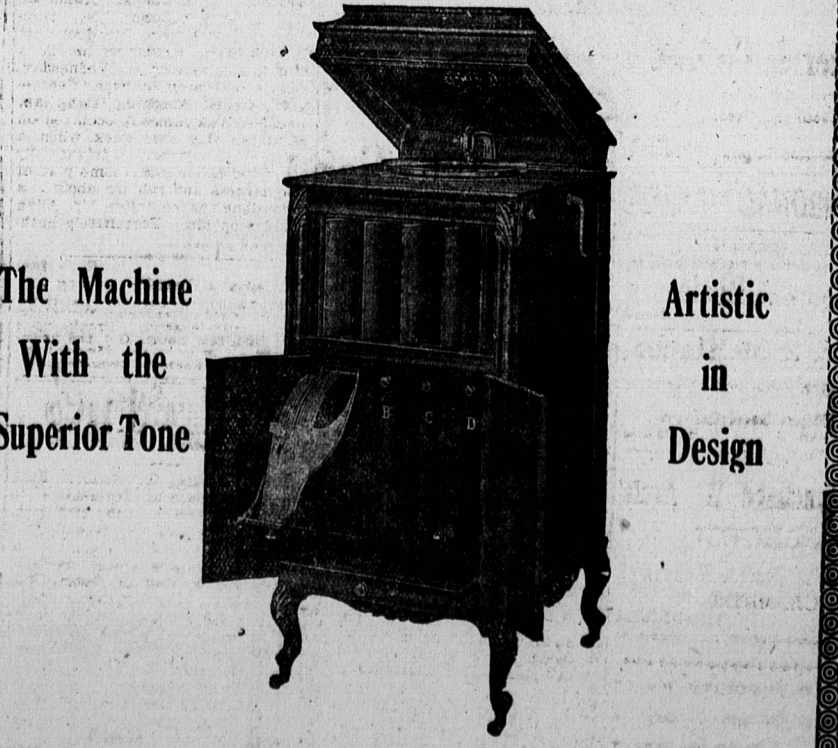
