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ISLAND HORSES WIN AT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, Sept. 12.—The weather man favored the horsemen with another grand day for racing and Halifax citizens turned out in thousands and filled the grand stands to their utmost capacity. Nearly ten thousand were present. The programme included the 2:25 trot and pace, 2:30 trot and free for all trot and pace. The 2:30 trot had eight starters. First and third money were captured by two Island entries, viz. Arkola and Brenton H. Arkola went a splendid race and was never headed in the three heats, his fastest time being 2:18 1/2. In this race the British Soldier was drawn after the second heat on account of lameness.

The free for all was handily won by the fast Fredericton gelding, Jas. K. Newbro, his fastest time being 2:10 1/2 in the third heat. This mile was the fastest since the meet began. Walter J. and Arlene fought every inch of the way for second money, while Hilda S., the only Island entry, got fourth.

The 2:25 trot and pace had eleven horses face the bell and not one received the flag in the first heat, although Barings Comet trotted the mile in 2:17 1/2. This race was one of the best on the programme although the stallion won in easy style. At times there would be several horses neck and neck to the home stretch.

Stock Notes.—The stallion Thorndale, owned by Hammond Kelly and James Roper, Charlottetown, won first prize in the three year old stallion class defeating the champion at the Winter Fair at Amherst.

old system of favoritism and jobbery on the roads which kept them in power for so many years.

Because it spent \$51,000 a year on steel bridges and permanent works, while the Liberals spent only \$11,000 a year.

Because it spent on permanent works \$40,000 a year more than the Liberals did.

Because in three years it spent \$153,000 on steel bridges and permanent works and paid every dollar out of current revenue, while the Liberals in their twenty years only spent \$218,000 on permanent works, and had to borrow the money to pay it and charged it to capital account. Note the difference.

Because they built a splendid Agricultural Hall at Charlottetown and one at Summerside.

Because they established a Long and Short Course for the benefit of farmers and farmers' sons.

Because they have materially increased the grant to Seed Fairs, Farmers' Institutes, Womens Institutes, established a course in Domestic Science and given all the assistance and encouragement in their power to these worthy institutions.

Because for the benefit of the farmers they have built and put in operation at St Peter's Bay, a self-loading and self-discharging mussel mud scow, capable of carrying eight car loads and delivering one train load a day.

The St Peter's Bay mud is acknowledged by all farmers to be the best quality of mud on the Island, the supply is practically inexhaustible and it is sold at cost to the farmers, so that farmers in every part of the province can have it delivered at cost at the nearest station.

Because the policy of the Government is to build and operate similar mud scows in other bays where this valuable fertilizer can be procured.

Because they have increased the grants to the Deaf and Dumb Institution and School for the Blind.

Because they have increased the grants to the Children's Aid Society and the Anti Tuberculosis Society.

Because they have given a grant of \$500 to each of the City Hospitals and a grant of \$400 to Prince County Hospital and \$100 each to the two Orphanages.

Because through the munificent gift of a prominent member of the Government and the co-operation of the Government a splendid up to date Sanatorium has been built and equipped where those afflicted with tuberculosis may be cared for and treated and that dreaded disease be checked from spreading all over the Province.

Because they have obtained a new cable between Cape Traverse and Tormentine and a similar one between Wood Islands and the mainland thus insuring uninterrupted cable service the year around.

Because they have secured cheaper telegraph rates, a message which formerly cost \$1.50 now costing only 30 cents.

Because they have granted \$15,000 to the Patriotic Fund to provide for the wives and families of the brave men who are now fighting in defence of home and country and have otherwise given every encouragement and support to the brave men and boys who have offered their lives in defence of the Empire.

Because with a total expenditure of \$521,000 last year the Hon. Mr. Richards, Leader of the Opposition, when challenged by Premier Mathieson to point out one single item in that large expenditure which he considered extravagant, uncalled for or otherwise unwarranted, he was unable to do so.

Because the Hon. Mr. Richards, Leader of the Opposition, endorsed all the acts and approved of all the expenditures of the Mathieson Government and gave it a clear certificate for good, clean, honest Government, a compliment that was never paid to any other Premier or Government.

Because the Mathieson Government was the first Government to give the country a full and complete statement of the debt, outstanding accounts, unfinished contracts, and every dollar of liabilities against the Province on the close of each fiscal year, thus setting an example of clean business like methods of Government worthy of being followed by future Administrations.

Because they have not only given clean, honest Government but advanced and progressive Legislation, among which may be mentioned the Ballot Act. The above are not wild, unfounded statements to influence Voters, but a plain simple recital of some of the things which the Mathieson Government has accomplished in the last 3 1/2 years, everyone of which statements may be verified by reference to the Public Accounts, Read and weigh these reasons carefully and see if they are not worthy of your vote and support on the 16th and then in the interest of good, clean, honest Government and the welfare of the Province mark your ballot in favor of the Government candidates and give the Mathieson Government a chance to finish its work.

Mr. Higgs asked the audience the other night to look backward with him over the history of the province. He then proceeded to give a onesided statement covering this history since 1877. He however forgot to tell us that in 1878 when the then Liberal Government found themselves stranded their Commissioner of Public Works wrote letters to the overseers of Roads throughout the country as early as October not to draw any more on the department till after the end of the financial year—and they for the first time prostituted the sacred precincts of the Educational Department and only paid the teachers three quarters salary thus leaving a debt to drag along for all time to come.

Their policy was so outraged by their unpopular Legislation and conduct of affairs that indignation meetings were held from North Cape to East Point and the corrupt and dishonest Liberal Government (so-called) was driven from place and power.

The Conservative Government got the reins they found the public accounts both cooked and muddled. The province called upon the Auditor—(who is still with us) to make an adult up to the end of the financial year—and he, the sworn auditor of the late Liberal Govt, made and signed a statement that the public accounts of the Province showing "That if the liabilities of the Province were paid to the end of the year the Provincial Debt was \$52,000.—This is the "Nest Egg" from which the brood of annual deficits and our present provincial debt have sprung.

The Conservatives conducted the affairs of the Province for 12 years without taxing the country one cent and would have liquidated the legacy of \$52,000 and come out with a surplus—only, unfortunately for the Government and province. The Liberals had a majority in the Legislature of which the New Leader of His Majesty's disloyal Opposition, Mr. Benjamin Rogers, was a member and the President. Every Bill for Reform and retrenchment passed by the Conservative House of Assembly was killed in the Liberal Legislative Council. Year after year the Government were accused of robbing the province and they—me the same fate Oh, yes, Mr. Higgs also forgot to tell us that the charge he trumped up of withdrawing from capital was the act of the Liberals as well as the Conservatives as the Liberal Legislative Council of which the present Leader of the Opposition, Mr. Benjamin Rogers was President, passed the bill without protest. After 12 years of the most economical Government and no tax put on the farmer's the Conservatives were succeeded by the Liberal Peter's Government the most disgraceful and dishonest that ever held power in the Province.

At the first election the Premier stated on every platform that the days of taxation were far distant and within a few months after the election prepared a tax act. Who first INTRODUCED THE EXTERIOR AUDIT? Premier Peter's Government and two Bank experts to make it. Will we refresh Mr. Higgs memory and the Patriot by calling their attention, but it is unnecessary, they do not forget only sometimes it is inconvenient to remember that they include the Liberal Deficit of \$52,000 and also charge the late Conservative Government with \$33,000 unearned subsidy, and other items which they were not responsible for and made the debt \$171,000 but paid it off with their first issue of \$185,000 Debentures. There is their own starting point and we were willing to accept it, although stuffed with the Conservative Government's pledge that the securities of the Province for the payment of it, at any discount offered.—This is Liberal financing with a vengeance. The new Conservative Premier when he realized the state of affairs started for New Brunswick and paid the indebtedness of the Province under Liberal rule at 6 per cent annum and brought home the securities of the Province, which he afterwards sold at a premium. This is a sample of the difference between Liberal and Conservative financiers and it holds as good today as then. There never was a Liberal Government since the days of George Coles but ran the country in debt and destroyed its credit and for dishonest and disgraceful acts, "for ways that are dark and tricks that are vain they can claim the palm.

Mr. Duffy boasted that they had no sins to answer for—yes, and their late leader and his support in the last Legislature had to withdraw. This is the old game—to get clear of their graft at election time. As to where the money goes under Liberal rule, see their election years when their deficits were doubled and every cent of the Road money paid by farmers and all the rest of the Public Money was spent to keep them in power. People employed to shovel slush on the Roads in December, and giving Road orders for any price to cater votes. When public opinion got to the boiling point they shipped off the Premier and got another that HAD NO SINS to answer for. He dared not face the country and when he found himself in the minority he gave one member of the Legislature a bribe that put him into political sleep and bribed and bought another and then had the effrontery to boast in the Legislature that he "had supplied an able seaman and saved the ship's state from going on the rocks. They swapped him off and got still another Leader

or who pleaded himself that he had no sins to answer for. Well perhaps not, but the public cannot forget. He is not so sure at the present time but he served and was comfortably shelved off to a County Judgeship. And still another that had no sins to answer for went to the Bench and then another. And the last one "that had no sins to answer for," Fort Augustus thought differently and even his own party thought so. But they now resurrect him, not as a leader but as a heeler to shout for the party at political meetings. Low as the party has descended it would not tolerate as a leader one whose despicable attack on Premier Mathieson, whose latching he is unworthy to loose, either as a lawyer or a citizen, shocked even his fellow heeler.

This man and his party will find out on the 16th "who John A. Mathieson is" and where the "Beggars on Horseback" has landed and to their discomfort and dismay they will crawl into their hole and eat crow and give up the ghost and will never see the treasury branches for another generation to come. Let Mathieson finish the work and as Bro. Higgs would say, you will see the "Garden of the Gulf" rejoice and blossom as the rose, and where Mr. Higgs saw in a vision the ponderous scale in one pan of which "the Mathieson Government was going to tip up, up and in the other the Liberal candidates going down, down, down, he will see instead the words Peace, Prosperity and Plenty writ large not only over the heavens where the curious scale appeared but over the more tangible earth where men live and work and vote, and the province will be a veritable garden and Mr. Mathieson will be the Premier thereof.

The voter is to vote only for one Assemblyman, and if qualified for one Councillor for the electoral district.

The voter will go into one of the compartments, and, with a black lead pencil there provided, place a cross within the space between the dark lines containing the name of the candidate for whom he votes; (thus X.)

The voter shall then fold the ballot paper or papers so that the initials and stamp on the back and the number on the counterfoil can be seen without opening it; he shall then return the ballot paper or papers so folded to the deputy returning officer, who shall in full view of those present, including the elector, remove the counterfoil, destroy the same, and place the ballot paper or ballot papers in the ballot box. The voter shall then forthwith quit the polling station.

If the voter inadvertently spoils a ballot paper so that he cannot conveniently use it as he desires, he may return it to the deputy returning officer, who shall give him another.

If the voter votes for more candidates than he is entitled to vote for, or places any mark on the ballot paper, by which he can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not be counted.

If the voter fraudulently takes a ballot paper out of the polling station or fraudulently delivers to the deputy returning officer to be put into the ballot box any other paper than the ballot paper given him by the deputy returning officer, or shall show his ballot paper after he has marked it, his ballot will not be counted nor will he again be allowed to enter the polling station during the election and the elector will be liable to the penalties and disqualification provided by law.

PENALTY For Defacing Proclamations or other Election Documents Posted up.

(SECTION 198—THE ELECTION ACT 1913)

Any person unlawfully taking down, covering up, mutilating, defacing or altering any proclamation, notice or other document required to be posted up under any of the provisions of this Act shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Fifty dollars and costs, and not less than Ten dollars and costs or, in default of payment of such fine and costs, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months and not less than one month with or without hard labor; and if the person so offending is a returning officer, election clerk, deputy returning officer, poll clerk, or other officer engaged in the election, he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding One hundred dollars and costs and not less than Twenty dollars and costs or in default of payment of such fine and costs, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months and not less than two months with or without hard labor.
