Curran And Briggs In 16-6 Victory Over Abbies In Game Here Yesterday

Breaking out with eight runs in their half of the second inning, the Summerside Curran and Briggs team hung a 16-6 shelling on the Abbies in a regular Island Baseball League encounter played on the Memorial Field diamond yesterday afternoon. The game was poorly fielded by the Abbies in the first inning. The visitors themselves, no rocks of Gibraltar, blew up in the last of the third as the locals scored all their runs. The westerners added to their total in the fifth as they scored twice. They tallied five more in the sixth and scored their last run in the final inning.

Summerside pulled off some of the nicest hitting displays on Memorial Field as they bunted six hits in the second frame. In the whole game they bunted safely eight times. They made a total of sixteen hits while Cec Powell spaced eight although six came in the third inning.

Merlin MacKenzie started on the mound for the Abbies but was relieved in the sixth inning by Cyril Smith with one out. He allowed ten hits and was charged with twelve runs. He walked three and struck out three. Smith worked three and two third innings, allowing six hits each and three runs in each.

Hardest hitter of the game was Mulholland of the C. & B. team as he walked out three hits in four official times at bat. Les Gaudet and Cec Powell also of the winners each had three hits with one of Gaudet's being a booming triple into left field. Every player on the winners with the exception of their first sacker had at least one hit. Vern Larter, Joe LeClair, and Buck

Whitlock each had two hits. Mulholland also provided the fielding play of the day as he turned a one handed catch into a double play in the first inning.

Rochon Captures Quebec Singles Tennis Ch'ship

By VIC MORRIS, Jr. (CP)—MONTREAL, July 4.—(CP)—Little Henri Rochon, Canada's ranking tennis ace, captured the Quebec singles championships Saturday and practically assured himself of first-place selection on the Canadian Davis Cup team.

The tricky southpaw had little trouble in disposing of Jim Macken 6-4, 6-4, 6-2 in straight sets before a gallery of 1,500. The victory, gained in sweltering heat with the temperature in the high nineties, gave the Montrealer his second singles crown this year. Last week in Toronto he captured the Ontario title.

Pat Macken, Ontario women's singles champion, came through in easy fashion to gain a 6-1, 6-3 victory over defending champion Elaine Filides in the women's singles. Following the match Miss Filides collapsed at the clubhouse door from the heat.

Miss Macken and Miss Filides, both Montrealeers, joined forces later to win the women's doubles titles with a straight set victory over Mrs. Pauline Robinson and Nancy Common, 6-4, 9-7.

Rochon came back with George Robinson later to capture the men's doubles by defeating J.J. Desjardins and Jean-Paul Gofsky, 4-6, 6-3, 6-0, 6-4. Veteran observer gave Rochon and Robinson, on the strength of their brilliant play, the nod for the doubles pairing on the Davis Cup squad.

Rochon's defeat of the day came in the mixed doubles when, teamed with Miss Helen Stenstrom of Montreal, he bowed out 6-4, 10-8, 6-4 to Edgar Lanthier and Miss Francoise Lacasse.

ST. ANDREWS, N. B., July 3.—(CP)—Some 119 amateurs and 12 professionals, representing 20 Maritime clubs, will begin play here tomorrow in the annual 54-hole New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island amateur, open and professional golf championships.

Experts tonight were predicting low scores and picking Walter Reed, Jr., of Fort Fairfield, Me., a two-time winner of the amateur crown, and Archie Skinner, pro of the host Algonquin Club and many-times holder of the professional and open titles, as the players to beat.

Both the amateur and professional titles will be defended this year.
