

# HITLER OPENS DRIVE TO REGAIN COLONIES

## BROAD FEDERAL RELIEF PLAN ANNOUNCED

### PROVINCES TO CO-OPERATE ON SCHEME

Extension Of Housing Act And Absorption Of Single Unemployed In Primary Industries Aim.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—A plan under which the Dominion government will guarantee lending institutions against losses up to 15 per cent for loans to a maximum of \$50,000.00 to home owners for repairs and improvements on dwellings, was announced tonight by Prime Minister Mackenzie King and A. B. Purvis, chairman of the National Commission on Employment and Relief.

The government is also working, it was stated, on a policy of providing low rental homes in urban centres, possibly involving slum clearance, and the construction of houses as of a class suitable for those whose incomes enable them to purchase when convenient payments can be arranged. All this will be in conjunction with and dependent upon provincial, municipal and community co-operation.

At the same time it was announced that steps were being taken in co-operation with the provinces, whereby single unemployed transients would be put to work in primary industry during the coming winter as wages as near as possible to the general prevailing rate.

#### LEGISLATION INVOLVED

Following today's cabinet council the Prime Minister, Mr. Purvis and Labor Minister Rogers gave details of the broad policies on employment tentatively adopted. Some of them will require federal legislation at the next session, and some provincial legislation may also be involved. No special session would

## Excellent Exhibits At King's County Exhibition

Unfavorable Weather Fails To Dampen Enthusiasm. Premier Campbell Opens Fair At Georgetown.

One thousand people attended the King's County Exhibition at Georgetown yesterday. Attendance was smaller than usual owing to unfavorable weather conditions but from the standpoint of exhibits the show was a decided success. Classes were well filled and judges declared the average quality was up to that of former years with a very noticeable improvement in handicraft and cattle especially the Ayrshire class.

The show was officially opened by the Premier, Hon. Thane A. Campbell. Other speakers were: President of the Association, D. J. Stewart, Georgetown. Hon. W. H. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture, Mr. H. H. Acorn, M. L. A., Souris, Mr. Donald MacKinnon, M. L. A., Mount Buchanan, Mr. Mont Arner, M. L. A., Lower Montague. Hon. Mr. Dennis in a short address told of finding a record of an exhibition held in 1827, the first in Prince Edward Island. It was under the auspices of the Agricultural Association which had been formed the previous year. At that show exhibits included nine lambs imported from England. Since then 109 years ago, farmers have been continually trying to improve their flocks with considerable success, the minister pointed out.

## MADRID FACES FOOD SHORTAGE

Rebel Forces Control Agricultural Belt.

(By H. E. Knoblauch Copyright 1936 by The Associated Press) MADRID, Sept. 9.—(Unconfirmed via Hendaye, France)—A food shortage is beginning to be felt acutely in this seat of the Spanish Government as rebel forces continue to hold most of Spain's agricultural belt.

Tonight in Madrid there are no potatoes, fresh eggs or butter to be had. There is little sugar and a diminishing supply of vegetables. One can buy no fish. Meat is scarce and of poor quality.

Rebel forces hold the principal sources of beet sugar from Zaragoza and Granada. They also hold all the refineries except one in Malaga, another sugar centre. Milk is almost impossible to obtain, and when it is available it is rationed out at one pint per family a day. The bulk of the supply is sent to hospitals.

## Vessel Sinks In Collision Off Boston, 212 Rescued

## CHARGES JAPAN VIOLATING NAVAL TREATY

Navy Secretary Swanson Announces U.S. Program To Meet Japanese Submarine Increase.

(By Lloyd Lehbras, Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Japan's move to retain more submarines than permitted by the London Naval Treaty was termed "a violation" of that pact by Secretary of the Navy Swanson today, but the State Department kept silent about what action would be taken by the United States.

Secretary of State Hull not only declined to express his views on the Japanese note announcing their proposed increase in submarine strength, but refused to disclose whether any formal answer had been made to Tokyo.

Secretary Swanson—back at his desk after a six months illness—also announced several other important naval decisions, including:

1. The United States fleet will hold its next manoeuvres in North Pacific and Hawaiian waters in May and June of next year.
2. The navy does not favor establishment of a European squadron.
3. Plans for two new battleships are practically complete and actual construction could start "at a moment's notice." No decision has been reached concerning whether 14 or 16-inch guns will be carried, Swanson said, pending agreement by the Japanese government to a 14-inch limitation. The battleship plans, he added, will permit either calibre gun to be installed.

## Japan Rushes Ships To Chinese Waters

(By Robert B. Parker, Jr., Copyright 1936 by The Associated Press) NANKING, Sept. 9.—Japanese naval patrols were reinforced today in Chinese waters as an aftermath to the reported slaying of Junza Nakano, a Japanese at Peking.

Besides two destroyers, which, it was announced at Tokyo, had been dispatched to Chinese southern waters, other ships of the Imperial navy steamed up the Yangtze River to take up positions as far inland as Chungking. Japanese reports said Nakano was stabbed during a demonstration by Chinese.

## Rev. Dr. W. A. White Dies In Halifax

HALIFAX, Sept. 9.—Rev. Dr. W. A. White, Moderator of the African Baptist Association and for the last 17 years pastor of Cornwallis Street Baptist Church, Halifax, died early today. He had been ill several weeks.

Asserting "the rock of foundation of the state is an authoritarian will," Hitler said: "Unlimited individual liberty leads to anarchy. "All states have experienced the destructive effects of democracy.

## Summary Of Proclamation



Before a cheering multitude at Nuremberg Nazis Congress yesterday Chancellor Hitler formally launched a demand for the return of German colonies ceded to the Allies by the Treaty of Versailles. Coupled with the demand was the announcement of a four-year-plan to make the Reich economically independent.

## Summary Of Proclamation

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NUREMBERG, Germany, Sept. 9.—A summary of Chancellor Hitler's proclamation at the Nuremberg Nazi party convention today. He announced a four-year economic plan to make Germany independent in all raw materials which Germany can possibly create for herself—through her engineering, mining and chemicals.

He officially launched a demand for colonies which he said Germany could administer on a profitable basis. Germany's former colonies were taken from her after the great war.

Germany's present economic difficulties, Hitler asserted, were due to the absence of colonies and the fact the country has been squeezed for 15 years.
