#### THE EXPEDITION TO THIBET.

A British official bluebook on the Thibetan question throws light upon the expedition of Major Younghusband now on its way to Lhasa. Thibet being our next neighbor in India, has been very shy of intercourse, even to the extent of unneighborliness. Any attempt to open up communications with Thibet was met with the reply that the country was a dependency of China and that application should be made to Peking. When Peking was applied to the answer was that China had very little, in fact only a nominal authority in Thibet. These were, to say the least, embarrassing conditions. But in the meantime Russia had established communications with Thibet of an apparently cordial and reciprocal character. As long ago as 1900 a mission from Thibet arrived in St. Petersburg and in June of the following year another mission arrived at the same destination and was received with distinction.

But while this intercourse with Russia was being established and carried on, the authorities at Lhasa refused to have any intercourse with the representative of Great Britain, and a letter which was sent to the Grand Lama by the Viceroy of India was returned unopened. When the Russian Government was interrogated in regard to the missions which Thibet had sent to St. Petersburg the answer was that they had no political significance whatever. This did not satisfy the Indian Government. Lord Curzon wrote that "it is indeed the most extraordinary anachronism of the twentieth century that there should exist within less than 300 miles of the borders of British India a state and a Government with whom political relations do not so much as exist, and with whom it is impossible even to exchange a written communication. Such a situation cannot in any case be lasting." At length it was decided to send an expedition to open up communications. This is not necessarily a warlike mission, although it is somewhat prepared for emergencies.

Then the Russian Government wanted to know the meaning of "certain military movements which the Indian Government had undertaken in Thibet," and the memorandum went on: "In view of the very great importance which the Imperial Russian Government attaches to the avoidance of any cause of trouble in China, it would consider such an expedition into Thibet as calculated to produce a situation of considerable gravity, which might eventually force the Russian Government to take measures for the protection of its interests in those regions."

To this sharp note Lord Lansdowne replied, calling the attention of the Russian Ambassador to the language, "which seemed to me unusual and minatory in tone." He continues: "I referred especially to the statement that the Imperial Government might, in consequence of our action in a country which immediately adjoins the frontiers of India, find it necessary to take measures to protect Russian interests in those regions."

The Northwest Territories have had a territorial Legislature during the past sixteen years. This body is now composed of eighteen Liberals and seventeen Conservatives and these are said to be unanimous in favor of obtaining a provincial status. They are tired of being kept in the leading strings of the Ottawa Government and demand provincial autonomy so that they can govern themselves as Manitoba and the other Provinces do, receive a per capita subsidy and legislative grant, a debt allowance and all other appurtenances necessary for provincial housekeeping. It would seem that the time is ripe. The rapid influx of population and their growing importance make the Territories impatient of delay. But whether there shall be one, two or more Provinces is yet to be decided. We hear no hint of the matter being dealt with at the present session of Parliament, but if it is longer delayed a resentful feeling will be aroused which might operate against the Laurier Government.

es to protect Russian interests in those regions. I could not conceive why it was necessary for Russia to evince her interest in this matter. I trusted that his Excellency would forgive me for saying that this was not the only case in which complaints, which seemed to me gratuitous, had been addressed to us by the Russian Government in consequence of action which was within our undoubted rights. His Excellency would, I said, always find me ready to give him information as to events which might be of interest to both our Governments but it would be much easier for me to do this if the Russian Government would avoid the appearance of taking us to task upon such occasions.

The pretty strong language used on both sides serves to show that considerable hostile feeling had been engendered over the Thibetan question, which more recent events in the Far East must have served to increase rather than allay. Lord Curzon affirms that there is no purpose to invade or permanently occupy Thibet, but there is an obvious purpose to break in upon the exclusiveness which Thibet, under Russian incitement has set up. If any outside power is to exercise a controlling influence at Lhasa it shall be Britain rather than Russia.

It is related that Premier Peters and his new colleague, Editor McIsaac, arrived by the same train from the East yesterday and drove homeward in the same sleigh. "How good and pleasant it is for brothers," etc.

The financial disturbances growing out of the war in the East have only served to show the solidity of Britain's position. Notwithstanding the Japanese alliance there has been a steady increase of continental investments in London. Consols, although ranging below the figures which preceded the Boer war, are the steadiest of all national securities.

A good deal of noise was made over a gain of two seats in the recent by-elections for the Quebec Legislature. But it is to be remembered that the change in the relative strength of parties is quite insignificant. After the last general election in December 1900 the House of 71 members was divided into Liberals 63; Conservatives 8. Ten members in a House of 71 is not a very formidable showing.

In 1882 New Zealand began shipping frozen mutton to the Mother Country which arrived in good condition after its voyage of 12,000 miles, crossing the tropics on the way. In 1903 the shipments had increased to 239 million pounds weight valued at \$14,000,000. This affords an instance of what can be accomplished by cold storage. Canada is less than a quarter of the distance from the same great market, and we have a cool climate between. Surely there ought to be a chance to do something in the dead meat business here.

After all it did not pay to disturb the regular movements of the winter boats in the effort to secure the votes of the officers and crew in the recent by-elections. The men had probably no very great desire to vote; their votes would not have affected the result, had they voted, and the effort to get them to the polls was an entire failure. We hope that hereafter the winter steamers will not be agitated disturbed on any like occasion. Regular steamer connection with the mainland is too important to be disarranged and thrown out of joint to serve mere party interests.

Guysboro, N. S., has remained true to the Liberal standard, in fact gave the largest Liberal majority in its history at the recent by-election. It has been mainly a Liberal constituency, returning Liberal members in seven out of ten elections. Hon. D. C. Fraser had represented the county continuously from 1891 down to his recent elevation to the Bench. The new Liberal representative, J. H. Sinclair is a lawyer, 56 years of age and had represented the county since 1894 in the provincial Legislature. He is personally popular, and was no doubt a very strong candidate.
