Canadian Bacon Still Big Item On British Menu

But John Bull Knows Little About Amount Imported And High Standard Maintained.

LONDON, Oct. 16 — (CP)—Canada's bacon continues to give a new twist to Britain's monotonous rations but John Bull, while snatching his lips, more often blesses the pig-raisers of Ireland, Denmark or Yorkshire rather than Canadians. For eight years Canada has been the mainstay of the bacon ration, first at four ounces weekly, then three, now two in 1946. Canada shipped 2,539,536 hundredweight of total United Kingdom purchases of 3,465,686. In eight months of 1947, the Dominion sent 1,502,202 hundredweight of 197,114 imported.

But Canadian bacon is not advertised, apart from the name "Canada" stamped on Wiltshire sides the housewife may see at her grocer's before it is sliced. Usually the only sees the sliced, unidentified product on the counter. A survey of households in a London suburb revealed:

1. Housewives still are apt to confuse Canadian bacon with United States belly bacon, of unpleasant memory. They still have to realize that Canadian bacon, assessed as top quality, even by competitors is what they have been eating and praising. What they think to be best Danish, Irish or English is more likely Canadian.

2. Many have no idea where bacon comes from and care less so long as it is all right. New Zealand has a vigorous advertising campaign in progress to ensure she retains her markets for meat, butter and cheese when rationing is finished. Some housewives thought perhaps their bacon came from New Zealand.
