NO VENGEANCE FOR US SAYS LLOYD GEORGE

Declares End of Tunnel Through Which Allies Travelling is Nearer.

NEATH, Wales, Aug. 12.—Premier Lloyd George in receiving the freedom of Neath today declared that "the end of the tunnel" through which the Allies have been travelling for four years was getting nearer.

Mr. Lloyd George made no apology to any man, he said, for any part he had played during the war.

"And I propose to fight on to the end," he added.

Some people had complained, continued the premier, that he was too optimistic in the view he took of things.

"I don't think I am," he insisted. "I was not one of those who thought it would soon be over—never. I thought it a long job and a terrible job, but I have always been confident we would get through, for I knew we were fighting for the right and that the God of righteousness would see us through."

The premier appealed to his countrymen to put all the might of the Empire into the fight, "and," he continued, "we will be through the tunnel into the broad daylight of God's sun again, in a land of peace, real peace, without apprehension of sinister, dark plotting forces to renew the slaughter. No, never again."

"That is why I am appealing to my countrymen. Now we have confidence. We have good news. The annihilated army hit back yesterday morning at dawn. If anybody had told Ludendorff on the 22nd of March that in the month of August he would be trying to get his guns away from the advancing French and British armies—well, I don't know German and therefore I cannot tell what his answer would be, but I believe it would be in very strong language indeed."

"In that victory which will come for the alliance there will be no tearing up or greed, yea, and we pursue with a holy purpose of re-establishing right and peace on earth."

Sacrifices made by the people are immeasurable and those of the fifth year of the war will be gigantic but no refreshing breath of freedom and civic equality blows through the oppressive night of our discontent."

PRESS ADMITS "INVINCIBILITY" ILLUSION FLED

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The despondent tone of the latest German press comments is emphasized daily in special despatches from Holland. A despatch to the Daily Mail from The Hague, includes an editorial by the Dusseldorf Nachrichten, which says that nobody looking into the future can see an end to the war.

"For though it is true that the end might come quickly," it adds, "it could only be an end of terror as in Russia."

The Vorwarts of Berlin says that events of recent days at last have shattered the illusion, created by inspired optimism, that Germany is invincible. It says:

"The German people at last realize the colossal gravity of the situation. Let us have courage to admit that as long as the war is not ended it is not won and can be lost."

The principal north German organ of the majority Socialists, the Buerge Zeitung, of Bremen, says:

CONFERENCE OF PREMIERS.—In his telephone conversation with Premier Arsenault of Prince Edward Island over the new line on Saturday Premier Foster arranged for a conference of the three maritime province premiers in Halifax on August 27, to discuss matters of mutual interest.

CHURCH REOPENS.—The re-opening of the Hartsville Presbyterian Church took place on Sunday last. The Church building looked beautiful within. The repairs included a pastor's room, a choir room, a choir platform, a renovated pulpit and several other minor improvements. Services were held at 3 p. m. and at 8.15 p. m. and on both occasions large congregations were present. The preacher came from far and near. The preacher at both services was Rev. R. H. Stavert. In the afternoon Mr. Stavert spoke from Ps. 96.8 and in the evening from Luke XVII. 34-36. Both addresses were very favorably spoken of. The afternoon service was termed a masterpiece. The music was of a high order. The Hartsville choir was assisted by three members of the Brookfield choir. At the afternoon service Mrs. W. McKenzie sang a solo. In the evening members of the Brookfield choir sang the selection entitled "Heaven Seems Nearer" and Rev. R. H. Stavert sang a solo all of which were well rendered and much enjoyed by all. The offerings for the day were quite large.

ARRIVED SAFELY.—Mrs. William Cairns of Dunstaffnage, has received a telegram announcing the safe arrival in France of her daughter Margaret, a nurse in the Boston City Hospital Unit for overseas service.

THE MARKET.—There was a fair market yesterday. Eggs were quoted at 45c., butter 45c., chickens from \$1.20 per pair and upwards; green peas 40c. per quart; string beans 15c per lb. The outside market was fairly well stocked. New hay sold from 55 to 60 cents; oats 95c to \$1.00; old potatoes \$1.40; new potatoes, \$2.00.

HOME FROM CHICAGO.—Dr. Bag-nall, who has been attending the Dental Convention in Chicago, returned on Monday night. He reports that the convention was by far the largest gathering of dentists ever held in the world. Over 7,000 American and 115 Canadian dentists were in attendance. It was shown that the United States now has a total of 5,931 dentists enrolled in their army. One of the notable functions of the gathering was the unveiling of a monument to Dr. Black, who died recently and who was a recognized leader in the profession. Canada was honored on this occasion by the fact that the speaker chosen was Dr. A. W. Thornton, dean of the McGill University Dental School. The doctor reported that the weather was fine throughout the five days of the convention and exceedingly hot on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 6th and 7th, when the mercury registered between 101 and 102. The clinics and exhibits were large and varied, and much interest was shown in them. Among the dentists whom the doctor met at the convention was Dr. Walter Peake, formerly of Charlottetown, who is now practising his profession successfully in Chicago.

CHARLOTTETOWN TO MONCTON BY PHONE

(Moncton Transcript) "Hello! Is that Charlottetown?" "Yes! Who is speaking?" "Moncton is speaking." "What kind of weather have you in Charlottetown today?" "It is very much overcast, with a slight sprinkling of rain. How is it with you?" "In Moncton it is slightly overcast but no rain." "It is the editor of The Transcript, who is speaking," said the latter. "Yes! It is J. J. Enman, City Editor of The Charlottetown Guardian, who is speaking." "Can you hear me?" "Quite distinctly." "And so the conversation rattled on. Moncton, N. B., for the first time is connected with Prince Edward Island by telephone, without passing through Nova Scotia. The New Brunswick and P. E. I. Telephone Companies have a direct service now by way of Cape Tormentine, Port Borden and Charlottetown. The rate to Charlottetown for a three minutes' conversation is sixty-five cents. Heretofore the only telephonic communication from New Brunswick to Prince Edward Island has been by way of Pictou and the hearing was very unsatisfactory. The hearing today, however, was as clear and distinct as from one telephone to another within the city of Moncton.

A new cable has been laid between Cape Tormentine and Cape Travers and it works like a charm.

"Permit me" said The Transcript proprietor to the Charlottetown Guardian's City Editor through you to congratulate the Prince Edward Island people on the glorious news which was received a few minutes ago in The Transcript office from overseas, announcing a great Allied victory in the capture of Mont Didier; also in the fact that our Canadian boys are making a splendid showing in the present battle and in the additional fact that since Thursday morning the number of prisoners taken exceeds 24,000 with 300 large guns. This is New Brunswick's first message over the new telephone line to the people of Prince Edward Island and the latter will doubtless appreciate the news."

CANADIAN HOSPITAL BOMBED BY HUNS

LONDON, August 13.—The Canadian Press has received authentic details of the bombing of a large Canadian stationary hospital. Bombs exploded in the garden 35 yards from the administrative building. Almost every pane of glass was broken and shrapnel bit off the wall corners. The commanding officer was the only casualty. He was thrown by the concussion from a chair and received a broken rib.

CANADA'S WAR SUPPLIES \$1,200,000,000

(Special to the Guardian)

OTTAWA, August 13.—On what a grand scale are the operations in Canada of the Imperial Munitions Board is indicated in an official statement that the total value of contracts for shells, raw materials and supplies of various kinds up to May 31 was \$1,200,000,000.

No less than \$1,000,000,000 had been paid out on account of these orders by the Board to the same date. Of this enormous expenditure, shells accounted for \$684,500,000, the total number of shells produced in Canada at the end of May being 359,390,000.
