LONDON, May 15.—Mr. Richard Reid, the Agent General for Ontario, says his visit to the front raised Canadians in his esteem higher than ever but he was also impressed with the urgent need of still more men and more munitions of war.

Oats No. 2 white, 52 1/2 c. to 53 1/2 c.; Standard 53 1/2 c. to 54c. Rye, nominal, Barley, 73c. to 80c. Timothy, \$5 to \$6.50. Clover, \$8.50 to \$12.75. Pork \$17.70. Lard, nominal. Ribs, \$9.75 to \$10.25.

CHICAGO, May 12.—The markets today has been very unsteady. The belief exists that the damage to the wheat crop has been exaggerated. Wheat fell about one cent a bushel. Corn finished 3/4 c down and Oats steady. There was further complaints of dry weather from North Dakota. The demand for oats is very heavy.

WINNIPEG, May 12.—The wheat market is about the same as yesterday. There was a fair enquiry for export and also for local trade. The demand for oats was good and the prices ranged from 1/2 to 3/4 c higher.

TORONTO, May 12.—Wheat prices are off today in Toronto and business is very dull. There is no change in the coarse grains.

MONTREAL, May 12.—There was a slight improvement in the demand from foreign buyers for Manitoba Spring wheat. The cables from London indicated a good market. There were however only a few sales made and on the whole business was very quiet. There was no improvement in the coarse grains but the undertone is steady.

Potatoes: A steady feeling prevails in the market for potatoes but the trade is quiet. Green Mountains are bringing 42 1/2 c per bag of 90 lbs. extra.

Hay: The demand for baled hay is altogether local and prices are steady. Hogs: The feature of the hog situation was the stronger feeling which developed in the Toronto market yesterday and prices advanced from 15c to 20c per hundred lbs. An active trade was done in selected lots at \$9.50 per hundred lbs. of cars. The demand for dressed hogs continues fairly good, and fresh killed Ontario stock brought \$13.00 per hundred lbs.

Cattle: There was no change in the condition of the market for cattle today but the undertone was strong. The demand was good and the supply small. Butchers cows brought from \$4.00 to \$7.00 per hundred lbs.

ARREST FUGITIVE HUSBAND

NEW YORK, May 17.—Mrs. Mary Whiteman, of 1916 St. Nicholas Avenue, who suspected her husband, Louis, of looting with a woman whom he introduced as his wife, of the office of the Prudential Insurance Company at Newark, N. J., so that he could borrow \$900 on an endorsement policy of \$2,000, in which his wife was named as the beneficiary, was on Pier 49, North River, when the steamer Antilles of the Morgan Line docked, and pointed out her husband to detectives when he walked down the gangplank.

Whiteman was arranged before Magistrate Krotel in Jefferson Market Court on a warrant obtained by the insurance company charging him with forgery. He was held for examination tomorrow. Whiteman, 34 years old, was a designer in a Fifth Avenue cloak and suit house when he disappeared fourteen months ago. Mrs. Whiteman said:

"I found that a woman employed in the same place and who had often been about the same time. It was the same woman who went to the insurance company, representing herself to me, signed the cash voucher with my husband as Mary Whiteman."

THE EGG MARKET

The Canadian Countryman says "Egg receipts at Toronto, Montreal, New York, and Chicago, have been very heavy of late. At the present time the wholesale trade has probably 25 per cent more eggs in stock than they had a year ago at this time, and this situation is surpassed in the United States, where some 600,000 dozens more have been received than they had at this time last year. At the same time the volume continues to increase, and able authorities state that probably by the end of May the American receipts will show up double what it was last year.

Under these conditions prices are easier. This week a top of 20c is quoted by the wholesalers, and for eggs at country points f.o.b. the top is generally 19c. Quite a number of the Toronto firms are not making any energetic efforts to get hold of any more eggs, even although it has got to be recognized that the eggs of April and the early part of May are the choicest of all eggs. This year, too, they are choicer than ever, for weather generally has been of that kind which stimulates production, and at the same time works for high-class condition and long-keeping qualities.

"Eggs are dearer" said one of Toronto's best authorities, "but they are

so much better that they are worth it. There is improvement all along the line. We get better eggs, we get them put up and sold in a better way, and the total amount of musty or bad eggs received this year would only be a small percentage of those received at this time in other years. We get better shipping service. There are fewer eggs broken, in fact, the loss from this source is now very small. We get more prompt deliveries, and every way you look at it the trade is now enjoying better conditions."

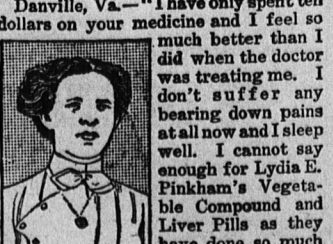
