CANADIANS SCORE TRIPLE VICTORY AT GAMES

Loaring Lowers Record In 440-yard Hurdles Event To Lead Canadian Forces

SYDNEY, Feb. 6.—Canada's colors floated high over the Empire Village tonight, hosted to victory three times by a pair of track and field men and a women's relay team at the opening of the British Empire Games Saturday.

Johnny Loaring of Windsor, Ont., led the Canadian performers with a record-breaking 32.9 seconds in the 440-yard hurdles. It was one of six Empire marks bettered, five at the Sydney cricket grounds park and field meet and the other in the North Sydney Olympic pool where the swimmers gathered.

The husky 22-year-old University of Western Ontario hurdler star kept up with the leaders for 300 yards then turned loose a burst of speed at the eighth hurdle that carried him to the tape 15 yards ahead of J. Park, Australia. Loaring's time was 1.5 seconds faster than the Empire record set in 1923 by Lord Burghley of England.

Opens Victory March
Jimmy Courtwright, Ottawa youth now a student at Queen's University at Kingston, opened the Canadian victory march with a 200-yard three-quarter mile javelin throw.

The swim team with Florence Humber, Montreal; Dorothy Lyon, Toronto; Noel Oxenbury, New Westminster, B. C.; and Phyllis Dewar, Vancouver, completed the trio of Empire championships for Canada in the women's 440-yard relay. They paced out the Australian quartet by 1.6 seconds in 4:31.3.

First Empire mark to topple was the women's 100-yard dash. Decima Norman, 22-year-old Australian sprint star, in her first heat cracked the eight-year-old record set by Elsie Huscock of England, and repeated with the same mark in the semi-final and final. Her time of 1:11 seconds was two seconds ahead of the English girl's.

New Empire Record
C. H. Matthews of New Zealand set a new Empire record of 13:59.5 in the three mile run; V. P. Enot of New Zealand clipped a tenth of a second from the 800-yard mark in his heat with 1:52.3. Edwin Thacker of South Africa jumped six feet 5 1/2 inches to break the mark of six feet three inches set by a fellow South African in 1930 and equaled by himself in 1934; and Robert Letvers of England swam the first heat of the 400-yard free Dolson, Toronto, first in preliminary heat; third in semi-final (eliminated).

Canadian entries placed in five of the six track and field events. Only in the 100-yard dash was Maple Leaf championship bid absent.

Four Canadian sprinters answered the starting gun for preliminary heats and three of them entered the semi-final where they were eliminated.

Civil Holmes of England won his heat and semi-final, went on to capture the sprint in 9.7 seconds, 1-10 seconds slower than Percy Williams of Canada needed for the Empire record he set in 1936.

Three of four Canadian female sprinters came through preliminary rounds and two advanced to the final where Jeanette Dolson of Toronto ran, third to Miss Norman and J. Walker of Australia. Barbara Howard, dusky little star from Vancouver, was sixth.

Sterling Struggle
The three mile run produced two sterling struggles, the battle for first place between Matthews and England's Peter Ward, and the last place fight between Canadian and New Zealand.

Jimmy Courtwright had identical distances, 297 feet, 3-4 inch, in the elimination and final rounds of the 440-yard hurdle event. He let J. Park of Australia set the pace for most of the distance. Loaring, the Canadian entry in the hurdle event, showed too much class over the 440-yard hurdle.

Three Indoor Track Records Are Broken

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—World indoor records were cracked in three events Saturday night as Glenn Cunningham, the celebrated "iron horse," ralloped off with a decisive Wanamaker Mile triumph for the fifth time in six years in the 31st annual Millrose A. A. meet at Madison Square Garden.

Cunningham equalled the meet record of 4:31. for the second time, in beating his fellow Kansan, Archie San Romani, by a dozen yards, but the world-shattering honors of the night went to Jimmie Johnson, Columbia University champion and sprint ace.

Johnson shot off the marks like a jack-rabbit to equal, and then twice surpassed the long-standing indoor mark of 6.2 seconds for the 60 yard dash. He was clocked in 6.1 seconds in his semi-final and then stroked to the tape in six seconds flat in the final.

Forrest (Spec) Towns of Georgia winner of the 60-yard low time of 7.4 seconds after Wayne Tomleck of Wayne University out of the former world indoor mark to this figure in his first trial heat. Tomleck was beaten by Towns in a brisk final brush. The former record was 7.5 seconds.

North Texas Teachers' medley relayers, comprising the Brown and Risdon twins, lowered the world indoor mark of 7:27.9 in a thrilling victory over Indiana. The distance was 1 7/8 miles.
