

A DANGEROUS SHIPMENT.

MONTREAL, Sept. 20.—One of the most dangerous cargoes ever brought to Montreal came to port today, when the tank-shiper Euplectela tied up with a load of a million and a half gallons of gasoline, consigned to the Dominion Shell Co. from Singapore. Owing to the explosive nature of the cargo the crew had a hard time during the voyage, all smoking being prohibited, while the galley fire was seldom allowed to be used for cooking purposes. In addition to the regular crew, the vessel carried a squad of watchmen whose special duty it was to see that no matches were struck, that none of the crew dared to smoke, and in other ways to see that all danger of firing the inflammable gasoline was avoided. Similar precautions are observed in port. No one is allowed within a big radius of the vessel, and the gasoline is being pumped from her tanks by underground pipes. Owing to these precautions the immense cargo of automobile fuel has been safely brought to its destination. It is stated to be probably the largest single consignment of gasoline ever brought to Canada.

PEER'S WORK FOR CANADA.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Lord Montagu, of Beaulieu, who recently returned from Canada, is contributing a special series of articles to the agricultural papers, in which he comments on the up to date farming methods in Canada; particularly with reference to the value of mechanical appliances.

In his description of his process by which the three agricultural operations of plowing, harrowing and rolling are performed at one time under the guidance of two men at the rate of thirty acres a day is a revelation to the British farmer, who adheres to the old methods. It is of value, too, to the capitalist who proposes to take up land in the dominion, but is deterred by hearing of the shortage of farm laborers.

CHINESE REFORM IS AGREED TO

LONDON, September 21.—An important program in the interest of reform has been drawn up and agreed to by the four Chinese leaders, President Yuan Shi Kai, ex-provisional president, Sun Yat Sen, Vice-President Li Yuan-Heng, and acting Premier Huang Sing, according to the Daily Mail's Peking correspondent. The program, he says, represents an agreement between the opposing parties, and on the question of constitutionalism is a compromise between Yuan Shi Kai and Li Yuan Heng. The following are the principal headings of the program. The empire is to be placed under an unified system of government; the military system is to be centralized; China will be opened to foreign capital to build railways, open mines, erect steel works and to carry on every kind of manufacture calculated to benefit the people, while every encouragement will be given to agriculture, forestry, and industrial and commercial enterprises.

Military affairs, diplomacy, finance, justice and communication are to be conducted under a certain power. Provincial affairs will be dealt with under the principles of self-government, as far as circumstances will permit. The finances of the country are to be regulated at the earliest possible moment, political parties are to be harmonized and order is to be maintained.

RESIGN AS PROTEST.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 21.—At a meeting yesterday of the Armenian National Assembly, the resignations of the Patriarchs and the members of Lay Council were announced. This action was taken as a protest against the apathy of the government in the face of continued assassinations of Armenians. Despatches were posted in the Assembly Hall giving accounts of recent murders of Armenians at Diarbekir and other places in Armenia. Strong speeches were delivered at the session of the Assembly, denouncing Turkish oppressions against Armenians.

PETERBOROUGH, Sept. 21.—Yesterday afternoon natural gas was struck on the grounds of the parsonage of St. Joseph's Church, Douro, of which the Rev. Father McGuire is parish priest. A man was at work deepening an old well on the premises when a flow of natural gas developed compelling the digger to beat a hasty retreat. The nature of the gas was tested. It burned brightly. The flow has persisted for several hours and is still strong. The place is five miles east of Peterborough.

STRANGER PROVED TO BE AN UNCLE

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Sept. 21.—Coming from Los Angeles on a crowded steamer Harry G. Raymond, of San Francisco, offered to share his stateroom with an elderly gentleman, and thereby introduced himself to an uncle and fortune. Samuel Harrison, Raymond's guest, turned out to be his mother's brother. Harrison told Raymond that another uncle, Henry Harrison, died leaving a fortune of about \$500,000 to Raymond's mother, who died recently. Raymond and Harrison arrived here last night and departed immediately for Calgary, Alberta, where Raymond will receive his inheritance.

The Harrison brothers left England in their youth, were lost sight of, and made their fortunes in the Canadian Northwest.

McGill will this year make an effort to develop latent foreign talent in the ranks of the undergraduates. This alleged defect in the Arts curriculum has been the cause of much criticism. The Literary and Debating Society has not won an intercollegiate title for eleven years. Such ill-success began dissatisfaction. Last year the Literary Society executive and the McGill Daily commenced an agitation which resulted in a petition to the Arts Faculty for the introduction of a regular course on argumentation and public speaking.

Dean Moyle and Professor Leacock espoused the idea and the faculty adopted it. Dr. Cyrus McMillan will conduct a special course on argumentation and kindred subjects, and Prof. Leacock will introduce open debating methods into his classes. Dr. McMillan's courses will be so arranged as to allow members of other faculties to attend.—Montreal. Exc.—Dr. McMillan formerly belonged to Charlottetown.
