In the Executive Council Chamber at 11 o'clock yesterday morning a goodly company, including the members of the Government and Legislature, with officials and ladies assembled to witness the presentation of the Royal Humane Society and Carnegie medals to Miss Bertha Rattenbury. These were granted, along with \$2,000 from the Carnegie Hero Fund, for Miss Rattenbury's heroism in saving Miss Abbie J. Wells from drowning in August last. The Lieutenant-Governor, in a brief but graceful address presented the Humane Society's medal, and Premier Haszard presented the Carnegie medal. Both medals are handsome in appearance and suitably inscribed. Hearty clapping of hands and personal congratulations followed the ceremony. Immediately afterward the Lieutenant-Governor presented to the Legislature a fine steel-engraved portrait of the late Duke of Kent, for whom this Province was named. Speaker Agnew, Premier Haszard and Mr. Matheson, the Opposition leader, gratefully acknowledged the gift.

The death of Rev. W. W. Lodge, St. John, took place at his home there yesterday morning after a very brief illness following an attack of pneumonia. The late Mr Lodge was about sixty-six years of age and entered into the Methodist ministry in 1866 and has been engaged in the Master's service almost continuously since that time—forty-four years of active christian labor. He was stationed in this city as pastor of Grace church for a number of years preceding the present pastor, Rev. William Harrison. He was an eloquent preacher, an earnest worker and his genial and kind temperament especially endeared him to all his acquaintances, irrespective of creed. Among his more important preaching stations were: Moncton (central), Marysville, Charlottetown, Apohaqui, Hampton, Fairville, St. Andrews and finally Exmouth street church, St. John. Four years ago Rev. Mr. Lodge filled the highest office in the gift of his ministerial brethren, having been elected president of the conference in 1906. That same year he was chosen one of the eight clergymen who represented the New Brunswick and P. E. Island conference at the general conference of the Methodist church. He was a native of Mapleton, N. S., and leaves to mourn two brothers, Matthew, in Moncton, and James, Fort Howe, N. S., and two sisters, Mrs Job Shantz, St. John and Miss L. A., Moncton. Besides his wife his surviving family are four sons,—Dr F. S., City, Wilson, in Western Canada; Harry in Boston and Shenton, attending Sackville College, also two daughters, Mrs John Gates, South Africa, and Miss Marie in St. John. To all these and to other sorrowing relatives the Guardian extends its sincere sympathy. The funeral will take place today in Moncton.
