BERLIN, Jan. 11--Acting under article 43--the so called dictator clause--of the Ge-man constitution, President Von Hindenburg today intervened in a coal dispute which threatened to tie up the Ruhr mines, signing an emergency decree vesting the Government's arbiter with wider power.

NO ICE IN HARBOR--During the last few days the ice has cleared completely out of the harbor, and the Rocky Point Ferry has continued service. Several days ago the ice was sufficiently heavy to warrant the discontinuance of the trips of the Hillsboro.

IS VISITOR--Mr. Donald Lawson, Los Angeles, Cal., arrived in the city yesterday morning to visit his brother, Mr. J. A. Lawson. This is Mr. Lawson's first visit to Prince Edward Island. The first part of his trip he made by sea, passing through the Panama Canal, thence to New York Mr. Lawson arrived here about 3.45 Sunday morning as the train from the mainland had been delayed. He remarks on the sudden transition which he experienced from the sub-tropical weather of California to one of the worst blizzards in recent years in this Province.

SHOVEL YOUR SIDEWALKS--It has been very noticeable during the present winter season, that a large percentage of the citizens do not shovel the sidewalks in front of their residences, with the result that when a wild spell comes, said frontage resembles a skating rink, or still worse--a veritable trap where pedestrians especially at night, are forced to walk with measured tread in order to save broken limbs. In many other cases, some citizens just scrape the surface of the snow from their sidewalks, and only about two feet wide at that. Surely there is a city by law to compel householders to shovel their sidewalks. A stiff fine perhaps might be a good reminder.

TRAIN MOVEMENTS Ten and fifteen feet of snow filled the deeper cuttings on all parts of the railway lines of the Province and snow fighting crews with trains and snow ploughs were despatched to clear the tracks in order that rail communication might be continued today uninterrupted.

A train going west from Charlottetown last night met a train working east from Tignish, between Emerald and Kensington. The train which left Charlottetown Saturday evening at 7.30 for Summerside arrived there at 6.15 last evening, having been stalled overnight at Kelvin. A train working on the eastern line reached Mount Stewart, and proceeded to open the Pisiquid-Lake Verde line to the Murray Harbour Branch.

The car ferry had a difficult crossing on Saturday night, the last for the season on the daily double service schedule. The Borden train, scheduled to arrive in Charlottetown at 10.20 p. m. did not arrive until 3.45 yesterday morning.

The heaviest snow encountered on the whole line was in the vicinity of Emerald, Kensington and Kelvin.

Moncton Eighth Wins Game

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 11--The Moncton Eighth Battery team defeated the Moncton C. C. J. A. four to three in a thirty minutes overtime battle in the Eastern New Brunswick Hockey League here Saturday night. As the result, the eighth Battery are on even terms with the C. C. J. A. at the head of the league with Sussex, the other entrant in the circuit occupying the cellar position.

Chinese Are Now Freezing To Death

SHANGHAI, Jan. 10--Hundreds of persons died in a snow and dust storm, which subsided tonight after raging two days southward from Mongolia's deserts to Yangtze Valley. The storm laid an icy seige over all North China. Hundreds of thousands were suffering acutely in temperatures averaging 15 degrees below zero. Large numbers continued to freeze to death.

Turkey Wishes To Cooperate

GENEVA, Jan. 10--Turkey made a bid for a share in the world's legitimate opium business by offering to enter the Geneva Narcotics convention if the other signatory manufacturers would concede her "a fair quota" of the international trade in supplying drugs. Speaking before the League's advisory committee on opium, Chevket Fouat Bey offered Turkey's cooperation in the regulation of narcotic traffic. He gave figures on Turkey's exports to European countries and said that on every shipment his Government notified the Consulate of the destination country.

Monthly Review General Business In The Dominion

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 11--During December general business in Canada showed only slight recession below the November level, says the monthly commercial letter issued by the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and was free from some of the disturbing influences which have operated in the past. The most pronounced decline occurred in the automobile and allied industries. Building construction during 1930, while less than in 1929 was greater than in 1928. For the second month in succession Canadian business seems to have followed a smoother course than world business. Activity in Canada, while somewhat below the November level and marked by irregularity in industrial operations, was comparatively stable and free from any disturbance either of short or long term character.
