### EMIGRATING TO AUSTRALIA

LONDON, December 23.—An interesting sidelight in the problem of imperial migration is furnished by the increasing number of Canadians and Americans emigrating to Australia. Sydney today reports the arrival of 55 Western Canada farmers.

### WHITE STAR'S GREATEST SHIP

LONDON, Dec. 23.—The White Star's latest ship Britannic is to be launched in the Belfast yards February 26th. She is 887 feet long and is 50,000 gross tonnage. Her maiden voyage will be made next September. Ship-building returns on the Clyde the present year show an output of for 1912 by 120,000 tons.

### MOVE FOR FREE WHEAT IN MANITOBA HOUSE.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 23.—A significant motion will be made in the Manitoba legislature on January 6, 1914, according to the notice given by Harvey C. Simpson, Conservative member for Virten, today. The significance lies in that it comes from a member of the government, and advocates the removal of the countervailing duty upon wheat, and gives the farmers the benefit of the Underwood tariff.

"Whereas, the congress of the United States of America has by recent legislation reduced the duty on wheat and wheat products entering the United States of America; and  
"Whereas, provision was made in said legislation for total removal of duty on such wheat entering the United States of America from any foreign country who would likewise remove such duty; and  
"Whereas, it is the opinion of this house that such removal of duty by the government of the Dominion of Canada from the United States of America would be beneficial to the agriculturists of Manitoba.

"Therefore be it resolved, that in the opinion of this house of parliament of Canada should enact such legislation as would give the farmers of Manitoba the benefit of the countervailing duty on wheat and wheat products as provided in the Underwood tariff."

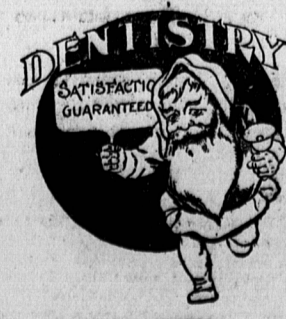
The resolution is doubly significant following Hon. Robert Rogers' Carman speech in which he stated that if the government found that case wheat would be in the interests of the people of Canada, then free wheat it would be.  
A similar motion is also to be moved by G. H. Malcolm, opposition, but this differs in preamble, stating that prices are higher in the United States.

RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.—An accident, the result of a runaway, happened to Mrs. McKenna, Grafton St., in Charlottetown, about 11 o'clock yesterday morning. A horse owned by Mr. P. S. Brown, and attached to a light wagon started to run up Weymouth Street from the station at a swift pace. The animal on reaching Grafton Street turned the corner to the west with unslackened speed. A lady, Mrs. McKenna, who lives on Grafton Street, in the vicinity of the store of Messrs Coffin & Co., and who happened to be crossing Grafton Street, from Parson's Corner to Coffin's, was knocked down and run over by the horse and carriage. She was picked up unconscious and medical aid was sent for. Miss McKenna was severely injured about the head and badly shaken up.

BOYLE-CRUWYS WEDDING.—At Kingston, on the evening of December 27th, at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. George Cruwys, parents of the bride, their daughter Miss Zella Maud was united in the Holy Bonds of Matrimony with Mr. Frank Edward Boyle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Boyle of New Haven, the officiating minister being their pastor Rev. George Orman. The bride, in a creation of white looked very sweet and modest. The bride-groom wore himself with dignity. Miss Emma Cruwys, sister of the bride, played the wedding march. She looked exceedingly nice in a white gown, while another sister, Miss Leila Bessie, also pretty in white, was bridesmaid. The bridegroom was supported by his brother Mr. Brewer Boyle. Only relatives, actual and prospective, were invited, but over forty of these assembled and participated in what was in every sense of the word an important event in the lives of the two concerned. MILTON WALSH.—"One who worked on the job" informs The Guardian that the work of removing the back range light at Summerside was done under the superintendence of Mr. Milton Walsh, of the Marine Department, and not under local supervision as previously reported in the Western Guardian.

### AEROPLANE VS. AIRSHIP

The aeroplane has much greater elevation powers than the dirigible. It can climb to 18,000 feet, and then its endurance is about exhausted. The Zeppelin dirigibles can rise to 10,000 feet and then travel for twenty hours at that elevation.

The dirigible has an average speed of forty miles an hour, against seventy-five miles an hour of the aeroplane. But no aeroplane loaded with guns and ammunition has yet travelled at a speed greater than sixty miles an hour. This is the speed of the Zeppelins being built for the German War Office. The aeroplane that runs short of fuel falls to earth. But when a dirigible has no more fuel it becomes a mere balloon.

This is the reason the Zeppelins are being built larger. They can then carry enough fuel to enable them to run 500 to 700 miles into the enemy's country and return without alighting.
