72,000 AMERICANS LANDED IN ONE DAY

LONDON, July 29.—The German official communiques have been anxious to inform the world that the great Marne battle is going very well for the Germans. This is based on the supposition that Foch has failed if he doesn't achieve a complete break through and meanwhile is using up his reserves. As a matter of fact, that is not the case, though, if it were Foch's reserves would stand a good deal of using up.

In one port in France 52,000 Americans were landed last week, and in

another transports carrying 20,000 men arrived one morning and left, unloaded, three hours later.

However, the forlorn German apologists explain that all this does not matter, nor does the Allied gain of ground, because Ludendorff is withdrawing his troops, according to plan.

BRITISH CASUALTIES FOR PAST WEEK

LONDON, July 31.—The British casualties reported in the week ended Saturday total 12,393, compared with the aggregate of 16,981 reported in the previous week. These are divided as follows:

Killed or died of wounds—Officers, 128; men, 1,764.

Wounded or missing—Officers, 304; men, 10,697.

PRESS CORRESPONDENTS PAY THEIR TRIBUTE TO THE SOLDIERS

PARIS, July 31.—All the French correspondents on the British front pay tribute to the gallantry and tenacity of the troops who repulsed the recent attack on Metzen. The Journal says the original captors of Metzen were there. They were Scotch men, which means that they were as firm on the defensive as they were bold in attacking. Instancing the curious effect of the unity of command, the Journal correspondent says "In the fighting west of Rheims French tanks supported British troops while in an attack by the French south of Montdidier. British tanks so powerfully assisted French colonials that the French general on the field presented a French flag to the crews of the British tank."

15,000 ALLIED TROOPS NOW IN MURMAN

PARIS, July 30.—The correspondent of the Neleste Nachrichten of Munich, telegraphs from Helsinki that he learns from reliable sources that the number of Allied troops now on the Murman coast has been increased to 15,000, including detachments now in the interior of Russia.

IMPORTANT CONFERENCES ON CANADA SHIPPING

LONDON, July 29.—Hon. C. C. Ballantyne has had several important conferences with the First Sea Lord on Canada's defence and also at the Ministry of Shipping regarding Canada's development and ocean transportation facilities.

STRIKE RIOT IN KALK, PRUSSIA

AMSTERDAM, July 31.—A new strike has broken at Kalk, Rhinish Prussia near Cologne, according to the Echo Belge. Machine guns were used to suppress the movement and the leaders were arrested, the papers declares. The police, it is added were still busy when the report was sent dispersing the crowds which continued to gather in the streets.

OVER HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN OFFERED FOR FARMS

TORONTO, July 31.—There are three thousand enemy aliens in Canada not complying with the Government regulations requiring them to report to the authorities at the end of each month. This has been shown by the man and woman power census just taken by the Registration Board. The names of all such aliens are being turned over to the proper authorities and they will be apprehended and compelled to register.

MAYOR MARTIN'S WIFE SEVERELY INJURED

MONTREAL, July 31.—Mayor Martin of Montreal, in his motor trip with Mrs. Martin through the White Mountains on his way from New York to this city had a bad accident when the bursting of a pipe in the auto caused Mrs. Martin to jump from the car and in the fall fractured her knee.

\$12,500 A YEAR TOO SMALL FOR THIS POOR YANKEE GIRL

Although Miss Lorena Carroll, seventeen years old, enjoys an income of \$12,500 a year, the sum is wholly inadequate in her belief to provide properly for her maintenance. She has requested Surrogate Fowler of New York, to increase the allowance to \$20,850 annually. The young woman, who is attending school, is the daughter of the late Joseph D. Carroll, head of Fiss, Doerr & Carroll, horse dealers, and derives her income from his estate of \$1,150,000.

Miss Carroll attributes war time conditions to the need of her additional allowance. Originally her income amounted to \$5,000, and by successive appeals to the Surrogate grew to \$12,500. Despite this latter sum Miss Carroll declared she was \$3,686.82 in debt to her mother for the last year. Itemizing her expenses, the young woman, who is a student at the fashionable Ogontz school, near Philadelphia, presented the following accounts in support of her application:

LONDON, July 31.—British Wireless Service)—The principle of the British government in dealing with India should be the progressive realization of responsible government, step by step, until India proved to the satisfaction of parliament that she was ready for home rule, is the view of Edwin Samuel Montague, secretary of state for India, as expressed in a speech at Cambridge. When the day came in which that process had been completed, added Mr. Montague, India would take her place in the commonwealth of free nations called the British Empire.

A WEEK'S CHANGES IN THE WAR

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Instead of being 28 miles from Paris, as they were a week ago, the German armies are now 49 miles from the French capital. The original line held by the Allies before they begin their great counter-offensive was 74 miles long. It is now 64 miles. General Marien (Chief of Staff, etc.) these statements Saturday in reciting the achievements of the French and American battering ram during the week.

"A German lieutenant," the witness said, "told me we have in the French overment a person who has belonged to us for many years." When I reported this in France I was told that it was useless to search for further information in this matter, but on my next trip to Germany I asked the name of this person and the German officer replied: "He is too highly placed. I fear too much for you and him."

The witness said that on returning to France she had two female spies watched and arrested. One of them told her, she said, that she had a permit to travel from Pascal Ceccaldi, Radical Socialist Deputy, who had said to her: "Keep silent. Make yourself forgotten."

"I knew," added the witness "of the relations between M. Ceccaldi and M. Caillaux. I asked permission to return to Germany to elucidate this affair, but my chief Col. Zoepf, refused, saying that I would only get shot, as I had only one chance in a hundred of returning. I insisted on going, but Col. Zoepf persisted in his refusal to permit it."

\$10,000,000 INTO POCKETS OF CANADIAN SHOPMEN

MONTREAL, July 31.—A stroke of the pen in Washington has just dropped ten million dollars per annum into the pockets of 30,000 Canadian railway shopmen and machinists according to an official statement made by W. M. Neal, General Secretary of the Canadian Railway War Board to night. When the car and machine shop employees applied for increases in pay recently the Canadian Railway War Board replied by offering the McAdoo schedule with amendments pointing out that amendments affecting these men were already under negotiation. Washington has concluded these negotiations with the result that the Canadian roads forthwith adopt the new McAdoo scale at the cost as above stated. "This," said Mr. Neal, "brings the total cost of the McAdoo award in Canada up from a point near fifty million dollars on the year's pay-roll, to near sixty million, so that the total railway wage-roll in Canada is today almost as high as the total wages of all the employees in the manufacturing business at the last Dominion census."
