MISSION BOARD MEETING.—The general Mission Board of the Methodist Church, with jurisdiction over the mission work of the Church in Canada, Newfoundland, Bermuda, China and Japan, will meet in Amherst tomorrow. There are fifty members on the Board, men representing all parts of the work of the Church. Col. F. S. Moore is the representative from P. E. Island. The income of the society from the several conferences last year was \$663,807.00, an increase on the year before of \$54,901.00. Adding to that amount the monies received from legacies and interest and from the special plant and extension fund there is now a total of gifts to the General Mission Fund for the year of \$758,577.95. The above amounts do not include the monies raised by the amount contributed by the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Conference was \$14,238.00. In connection with the meeting of the General Board there is to be a meeting of the Maritime Conference to which the ministers in active work in the conference and one layman from each district have been invited.
