SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES.

The latest supplementary estimates submitted to Parliament make the formidable sum of \$10,590,863. Nearly five millions of this will be charged to capital account and added to the debt. The first estimates, first, second and third supplementary estimates make a formidable total breaking all previous records of Canadian expenditure, and to this is to be added the commitment of the country to a stupendous obligation for a railway from Moncton to the Pacific ocean.

The particulars of the grants for Prince Edward Island in the latest supplementary estimates are given in another column. They make a total of \$683,450 of which \$480,000 goes to the completion of the Hillsboro Bridge and Murray Harbor Railway. The sum of \$87,000 is set down for increased accommodation at Charlottetown, presumably to include a new railway station. This will be a valuable improvement if built where the people want it and only a disappointment otherwise. There is a parently nothing for the improvement of our winter service or for an improved telegraph service. We must wait, whether Senator Cox can wait or not. The Patriot rejoices greatly over the large votes for the Island. But the total is not large when contrasted with the enormous expenditures provided for and liabilities incurred on account of the west. On the contrary our share of the spoil is small.

LET US HAVE THE PAPERS.

The circumstances of the commutation of Carver's sentence are so extraordinary and as we think the result so indefensible, that we hope and trust some one of our representatives at Ottawa will move for the production of all the papers bearing on the case. The strong feeling of indignation which prevails here renders this especially desirable. The people want to know how this astonishing act of clemency to a most undeserving subject was brought about, and they have a right to know. These papers include the full report of the trial and sentence, the report of the trial Judge to the Minister of Justice, the recommendation made by the Minister to the Governor General, together with all petitions, letters, telegrams, and other documents bearing upon this remarkable case. Let the papers be produced.

A letter from Premier Peters in regard to the appeal of the Island's representation case to the Privy Council is received, regrettably too late for publication this morning. It will appear in The Guardian on Monday morning.

The Guardian was quite in error in stating that no petitions against the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme had been circulated in or forwarded to Ottawa from Prince Edward Island. Such petitions have been circulated, signed and forwarded and we are very glad to learn the fact. An absence of some weeks from our editorial duties led to the error.

Russia is fast making her position impregnable in the far East. She has now in Manchuria proper 50,000 armed men with 18 batteries of artillery, and between Port Arthur and the Amur Province 110,000 more, while at Port Arthur and Talien Wan together are 50,000. These make a total of 210,000. Thirty forts have been erected at Port Arthur and fifty more are being erected on all the commanding positions in the district. These are Russia's answer to the threatenings of Japan.

The interest in Mr Chamberlain's coming campaign is shown by the fact that for his meeting at Glasgow on October 6 there were 50,000 applications for admission tickets while the seating capacity of the hall in which he is to speak is 5,000. It seems safe to assume that a goodly portion of those who applied a week or more before the meeting is to take place for an opportunity to hear Mr Chamberlain are at least open to conviction and not wholly opposed to his projected reforms.
