GERMANY AND ITALY QUIT NEUTRALITY COMMITTEE

Degrees Conferred At 83rd Commencement Of St. Dunstan's University

Express Hope Bombing Of Spanish Port Will Close "Deutschland" Incident

19 Persons Killed As German Guns Shell Almeria AWAIT REACTION Additional Warships Are Dispatched To Spain

BERLIN, May 31—(AP)—German warships avenged Spanish Government bombardment of the Nazi Battleship Deutschland and death of 24 of her blue jackets today in a surprise attack against Almeria, Southern Spanish port on the Mediterranean.

Military defences of the port were destroyed, the Government said. (Nineteen persons were killed, Spanish advisers said.) Then, with his customary swiftness of action, Reichsfuehrer Hitler withdrew from the European Non-Intervention Committee—(coincidental with Italian withdrawal from the 27-nation committee and its naval patrol to keep arms from Spain.)

Additional German warships were ordered to Spanish waters to aid fighting craft already there. They were ordered to fire against any threatening Spanish Government warship or airplane. Thereupon Germany sat back to await reaction. Official reasoning was thus: The Deutschland was attacked Saturday without reason while she lay in the Spanish insurgent harbor of Ibiza, Mediterranean isle; the port of Almeria was destroyed in revenge; the incident now is closed.

Abandon Neutrality Committee "The Reich's Government will not participate in the control system (the patrol of Spanish coastland to prevent influx of arms and men) nor sessions of the Non-Intervention Committee as long as no guarantee is given that such happenings will not recur," a communique said. "The Reich's Government, of course, will decide according to its own ideas on measures to be taken toward the red rulers in answer to the unexamined and treacherous assaults. MONTS, France, May 31—(AP)—The picturesque Chateau de Cande received today a \$1,300 consignment of flowers which will form a background for the wedding Thursday of the Duke of Windsor and Mrs. Wallis Warfield. Mrs. Warfield, assisted by a London decorator, planned the flower motif for the chateau music room where the wedding will take place. The decorator often arranged flowers at Fort Belvedere, the Duke's retreat when he was King. Mrs. Charles E. Bedaux, wife of the chateau's owner, was understood to have selected the \$1,300 consignment. The wedding ring, fashioned of Welsh gold by a Paris jeweler, arrived during the day, preceding the first wedding guests by 24 hours.

While masters of the chateau were preparing for the wedding, cooks, gardeners, and other chateau employees went ahead with plans for their own celebration of the ceremony. The first step was 32 haircuts. Next, the servants decorated their quarters for a wedding ball. They plan a dance in the garden pavilion Wednesday evening and hope Mrs. Warfield will look in for a glass of wine. Mayor Charles Mercier, who will perform the ceremony, finished work on a speech he will deliver. He disclosed that plans for a double ring wedding have been cancelled and the single ring will be used.

Developments Yesterday In Europe

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) Warlike acts brought new tension to Europe yesterday. This is what happened: GERMANY—Five warships bombarded Almeria, Spanish government port, in retaliation for the bombing of the German pocket-battleship Deutschland Saturday at Ibiza. Germany withdrew from the European Non-Intervention Committee, demanding guarantees that such incidents would not be repeated.

SPAIN—The Spanish government protested to the League of Nations against the Almeria bombardment which killed 20 and wounded more than 100. It asserted the attack on Almeria was without warning and contended the bombing of the Deutschland was provoked by the ship firing on government planes.

ITALY—Italy joined Germany in withdrawal from the Non-Intervention Committee and demanded satisfaction for the bombing of the Italian auxiliary war ship Barletta of the port of Palma, in the Balearic Islands, and the death of six of her officers.

GREAT BRITAIN—Steering a middle course, Great Britain counselled Germany to keep cool and do nothing more to make "a grave situation more serious," in the words of Foreign Minister Eden.

PARIS—officials said Germany approved a Franco-British plan to create naval "safety zones" around Spain. The plan was designed to avert collapse of the European "Hands-off Spain" accord and bring Italy and Germany back into the London Non-Intervention Committee.

VATICAN—Pope Pius XI cancelled the announced radio broadcast on his 80th birthday because, the Vatican said officially, of his physician's warning not to overtax his strength. The unofficial reason suggested privately by prelates was his address dealt somewhat with German attacks on Catholics and such criticism might be misconstrued as too political when there was a hint of danger in the air.

ON THE WAR FRONTS—Spanish government forces captured La Granja, northwest of Madrid. Insurgents repulsed a Basque attack on strategic San Pedro Hill, south of Bilbao. WASHINGTON—The Spanish Embassy announced it will ask for a statement of the United States' position in view of the withdrawal of Germany and Italy from the Non-Intervention Committee. Senators Borah (R-Ia) and McCellar (D-Tenn) demanded the United States apply its neutrality laws to outside participants in the Spanish revolution.

Seek To Alleviate Growing Tension In Europe

EDEN ACTIVE Germany Cautioned To Move Slowly In Crisis LONDON, May 31—(CP Cable)—The British Government strove today to prevent the international situation—already aggravated by the bombing of the German pocket-battleship Deutschland and the Reich's retaliatory bombing of Almeria—from becoming worse.

Foreign Secretary Eden told the House of Commons the situation was grave. He informed the German Charge D'Affaires in London the British Government hoped the German Government would take no action to render it "graver still".

Decision of Germany and Italy to withdraw from the Non-Intervention Committee dealt a severe blow to British hopes of arranging for withdrawal of foreign volunteers from Spain. Informal sources held little hope of discussions on that matter was possible until the bombing and its developments were settled.

Foreign Affairs Again To Fore At Imperial Conference

LONDON, May 31—The Imperial Conference tomorrow will again turn its attention to foreign affairs after considering other business during the past week while Foreign Secretary Eden attended the League of Nations Council meeting. The official communique on today's session stated Neville Chamberlain, who succeeded Stanley Baldwin as chairman, had suggested June 15 or 16 as a suitable date for the closing plenary session of the conference. Committee reports will be prepared this week and considered next week, it was indicated. It was expected the closing resolution would not go beyond the stage of expressing generalities. The meeting, in the form of a supper event, was presided over by Dr. Clark who welcomed the directors, members of the Ladies' Auxiliary, the Y's Menettes, and guests. A very delightful feature of the evening was a short program arranged by Mrs. Frances Holl Trainor.
